Miss Julia Klinger and Mrs. Klinger were in Lemont on Wednesday with Mrs. Burzloff who is seriously ill.

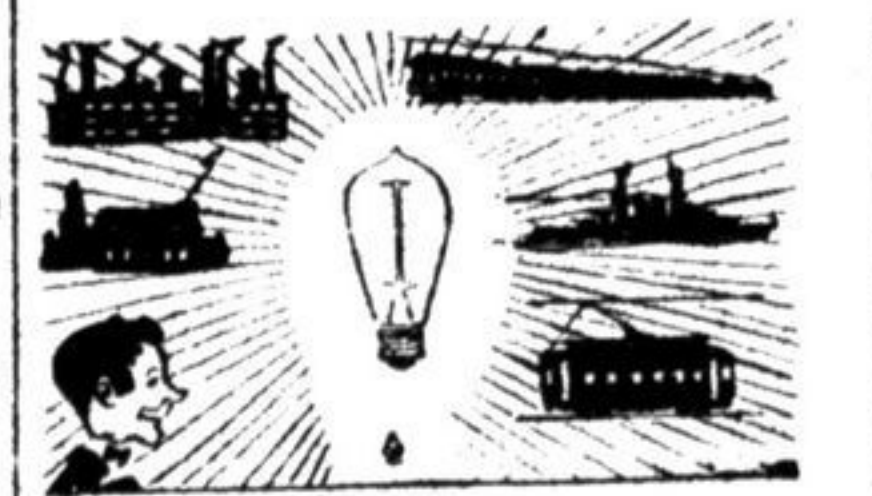

REPUBLICAN CENTRAL COMMITTEE ORGANIZED

The Page County Republican Central Committee was organized at Wheaton Monday afternoon with almost a full delegation of committee-men present.

The temporary organization was officered by W. Lee Capps, chairman and E. H. McChesney, Secretary. For the permanent organization there were two nominees for chairman; W. Lee Capps, of Downers Grove, and John Leedle, of West Chicago. On roll call vote Mr. Capps was elected with 117 votes, Mr. Leedle receiving 95 votes. The number of votes to which each committeeman is entitled is based on the number of Republican votes cast at the last general election. On motion of Mr. Leedle Mr. Capps was declared the unanimous choice of the convention for chairman.

For Secretary, Miss Hattie Glos, of Wayne, was declared the choice of the convention without a dissenting vote. Miss Glos is the only woman in the county elected as precinct committeeman and is the first in the county to serve in that capacity.

E. H. McChesney, of Glen Ellyn, who for many years was secretary of the Central Committee, was chosen treasurer.

Delegates were named to the Congressional convention which was held at Aurora on Wednesday and also to the state convention which convenes in Springfield today.

The convention adjourned to meet at Wheaton on Saturday afternoon, May 20.
