PUBLIC HEARING ON PAVING HELD MONDAY NIGHT

Proposal of Board of Local Improvements Will be Passed for a Concrete Highway.

Many property owners attended the public hearing of the Board of Local Improvements Monday night when the paving of certain south side streets was up for discussion. The general tone of those present was very favorable to the proposal as sent out by the Board and the ordinance will be passed substantially as presented.

A few objections were raised, several of the property owners thinking that a tarvia pavement was sufficient for the traffic. This idea, we understand, will not be considered and the original plans for a concrete pavement will be carried out.

This is a permanent improvement, one which will last for years and the Board believes that concrete is the type of pavement which will stand up. That while the first cost is higher than tarvia and several other types of hard surfacing, the cost is more than made up by having a permanent highway. One has only to travel over the streets of Hinsdale, Naperville and several towns in the vicinity where a pavement similar to tarvia has been installed to appreciate the difference. Not only do chuk holes form, but the roads develop a "wave" which, while it does not interfere with horse drawn vehicles, is mighty uncomfortable to motorists.

The next paving special to be considered, in we believe, the north side streets, Washington, Elm, Rogers, Franklin and Prairie. These also are destined to have a concrete surface.

"CO-OP" EGGS PAID HIGHEST

Egg marketing co-operatively by associations of producers organized in the state this spring by county farm bureaus and the I. A. A. are now receiving one and one-half cents a dozen above top Chicago price, on account of superior quality and grading.

Six of these egg marketing associations have been formed and six others are now in the process of formation. These associations have been able to reduce their operating expenses to one and one-fourth cents a dozen.

MILLION SAVED BY WOOL POOLS

Figures sent to the American Farm Bureau Federation by twenty-two state wool pools indicate that more than one million dollars, \$1,013,590.13 was saved to producers by the various state wool pools. \$17,731.48, or an average of about three cents a pound, was saved to producers in the Illinois Agricultural Association wool pool.

These figures were compiled by the state farm bureaus from questionnaires sent to county farm bureaus and producers pooling wool.

The twenty-two states pooling wool in 1921 pooled 22,298,866 pounds and received an average price of a little over twenty cents a pound net to producers. The I. A. A. pool amounted to 700,000 pounds and brought producers a net average of more than sixteen cents a pound.

The Ohio wool pool of more than five million pounds was the largest in the country.


