

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE VILLAGE BOARD

Downers Grove, Ill., April 24, 1922.
Regular meeting of the Council of the Village of Downers Grove, Ill. Present at roll call Mayor W. C. Barber and Commissioners Bender, Haller, Bryce and Heartt.
Minutes of the meeting of April 17th, 1922 were read and Commissioner Heartt moved to approve same. On roll call Commissioners Heartt, Haller, Bender, Bryce and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried. Commissioner Heartt presented an ordinance entitled "An ordinance amending section 1 of an ordinance entitled "Signs" Chapter XLIV" and moved for its passage. On roll call Commissioners Heartt, Haller, Bender, Bryce and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

Commissioner Bender presented an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to establish official time in the Village of Downers Grove and accomplish daylight saving thereby after the year 1921" and moved for its passage. On roll call Commissioners Bender, Bryce, Haller, Heartt and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

AN ORDINANCE
To establish official time in the Village of Downers Grove and accomplish daylight saving thereby, after 1921.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Village of Downers Grove.
Section 1. Central standard time shall, from and after the year 1921, be the official time within the Village of Downers Grove for the transaction of all Village business; except that from 2:00 a. m. on the last Sunday in April in the year 1922 and every year thereafter official time for the Village of Downers Grove shall be advanced one hour and at 2:00 a. m. on the last Sunday in September of the year 1922, and every year thereafter such official time shall by the retarding of one hour be returned to Central standard time; and all legal or official proceedings of the Village Council and all official business of the Village shall be regulated thereby; and when, by ordinance, resolution or action of any municipal officer or body, an act must be performed according to such official time.
Section 2. All clocks or other timepieces in or upon public buildings or other premises maintained at the expense of the Village of Downers Grove shall be set and run according to the official time as provided in Section 1 hereof, and it is hereby made the duty of the officer or other person having control and charge of such building or buildings and premises to see that the said clocks or other timepieces are set and run in accordance with the official time as provided by this ordinance.
Section 3. All persons residing within the Village and all persons, firms or corporations doing business within the Village are hereby requested to set and run any clocks or other timepieces under their control within the city in accordance with the official time as provided by Section 1 of this ordinance.
Section 4. All ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.
Section 5. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

On roll call Commissioners Heartt, Haller, Bender, Bryce and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

Commissioner Bender submitted recommendation of the Council acting as the Board of Local Improvements, together with an ordinance, providing for the local improvement of constructing cast iron water pipes in East Chicago Avenue, Fairview Avenue, Rogers Street, East Maple Avenue and other connecting streets and avenues in the eastern portion of Downers Grove, Illinois and recommending that a petition be filed in the County Court, said improvement to be known as Special Assessment No. 60, and moved that the ordinance be passed. On roll call Commissioners Bender, Bryce, Haller, Heartt and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

Commissioner Bender submitted recommendation of the Council acting as the Board of Local Improvements, together with an ordinance, providing for the local improvement of grading roadways, constructing storm water drains with storm water inlets, constructing curb and gutter, placing to line and grade storm water inlets and placing to grade existing manhole covers and paving with concrete the roadways of Lyman Avenue, from the southerly line of Maple Avenue to the south line of Farley Place, extended westerly; Farley Place from the easterly line of Lyman Avenue to the westerly line of Park Avenue; Benton Avenue from the southerly line of Maple Avenue to the north line of Summit Street; Randall Street from the east line of Washington Street to the west line of Elmwood Avenue, except the intersection of Fairmount Avenue and Randall Street, and recommending
