FARM PRODUCTS FREIGHT RATES "FAR TOO HIGH"

Joint Commission of Agricultural Inquiry to Report Facts to Congress

The report of the Joint Commission of Agricultural Inquiry shows that the average freight rate on grain, hay, live stock, eggs, cotton, etc. is from 40 to 100 per cent above the 1913 level. Figured in terms of transportation, the commission reports, the farmer is suffering from a 72-cent dollar.

The Joint Commission of Agricultural Inquiry, after an investigation of months, has decided to report to Congress that the transportation rates on farm commodities are out of all proportion to the price and that immediate reductions in freight rates should be first applied to farm products.

"Regardless of the distance involved," says the report, "transportation charges must enable both the carrier and the producer to realize a profit from his operations."

Thackeray's Birthplace.

Calcutta gave England one of her greatest novelists for William Makepeace Thackeray was born there on July 18, 1811. The novelist's father was an Indian civil servant, as also had been his grandfather, and his mother was the daughter of yet another servant of the old John company. The city of Calcutta has not forgotten her famous son and to celebrate his centenary ten years ago a memorial with an inscription from "Henry Esmond" was unveiled in the Church of St. John, where he was baptized.—Manchester Guardian.
