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DELEVAN LAKE SCOUT CAMP TO OPEN ON JUNE 26 Eleven Paid Men on Camp Staff—Eats Excellent—Supervision More Than Ample.

Many of those who are interested in their boys have received this last week an advance circular of information concerning the 1922 camp to be operated on Delevan Lake by the West Suburban Council of the Boy Scouts of America. It is surprising what the Scout organization is doing and many do not know what excellent things there are until they dig into the real thing: the scouts do there.

At a meeting of the camp committee, held at the home of A. M. Harvey in LaGrange, recently, the entire program was gone over and after careful consideration of the details of all the important features, they were approved.

The camp is to open June 26 and close August 19. There is some thought of operating for two weeks longer for a few older and more advanced scouts. The scouts will leave the Union station at 3:50 p. m. on Monday afternoon on the C. M. & St. P. They will detrain at a point three miles north of Walworth and then hike three miles into camp. Their baggage is carried for them. Every detail is worked out and all moves like clock work. About the first thing the scouts do on arriving is to eat. They are regular boys and like all out-of-door scouts they eat any time they can get it.

This camp has an excellent reputation especially for its table. Every boy who has been there is loud with praises of what they get to eat.

The staff this year will consist of eleven paid men on the permanent organization and six scoutmasters and assistants. In the literature recently published, the leadership rating was given as one to every eight scouts. It now appears that it will be about one leader to every seven and possibly six scouts.

The scouts are wakened at 6:00 in the morning by the bugler and the first thing they do is setting up exercises. Then they all take a dip. Mr. Barnes says, "the morning dip is fine for the scouts but hard on the breakfast as the scouts seem to pick up a wonderful appetite in the dip."

From then on, all the day there are instructive and pleasing things for the scouts to do. He has his choice of several activities. Every few days he is weighed and a careful check is kept on all his activities and condition. There is no scout allowed in a boat unless he can swim a short distance and a life preserver is kept in every boat on the ratio of one for each occupant.

Those Scouts who have enjoyed one or two summers at the camp can testify to the really great benefits they have derived from the two or three weeks stay. We hope that all Downers Grove scouts who wish, may be able to attend the camp this year.
