ELECTION NOTICE

Notice is hereby given that on Saturday the 17th day of June 1922 at the Village Hall in the Village of Downers Grove, County of DuPage and State of Illinois, an election will be held for the purpose of deciding the question "Shall certain territories be annexed to the Village of Downers Grove, the external boundaries of which are as follows:

REFERENDUM FOR ADMITTANCE OF A. C. DUCAT EST.

Trustee of the Estate Petitions the Board for Annexation to the Village.

At the meeting of the Village Council held last Monday evening the Chicago Title and Trust Company, trustee for the A. C. Ducat estate, petitioned for annexation.

Lots 2 and 3 are within the corporate limits but lot 1, which adjoins the western limits of the village, which is the part of the estate to be annexed. Commissioner Heartt presented a resolution to accept the petition and the date of the election was set for June 17.

The voters will also decide on that day to admit territory south of Maple Avenue, subdivided by Mr. G. H. Bunge. The polling place will be at the Village Hall.
