FAVORS CAGELESS ZOO

Henrick Hagenbeck, of Germany, dealer in wild animals, visited the site of the proposed McCormick zoological gardens in the forest preserve last week with John T. McCutcheon and several other directors. Then he returned with them to the Hotel La Salle and showed them pictures of his 26,000 acre zoo in Hamburg, Germany.

"The carnivorous animals," he explained, "can be given their part of the preserve and natural barriers can be made so that no cages or fences will be required. The deer and other animals that have a strictly vegetarian diet can be segregated in another part of the park."

"The best way to handle the birds is to allow them to fly in their natural state on an island, with perhaps a screening over the entire foliage to prevent them from escaping."

"The site in the forest preserve," he said, "is ideal."
