Sealed bids will be received by the Village Council, acting as the Board of Local Improvements, for the village of Downers Grove, DuPage County, Illinois, until 8 o'clock on the 5th day of June, 1922, furnishing all material and labor, constructing a curb and gutter, the necessary curb and gutter, Belden Avenue, in the Village of Downers Grove, DuPage County, Illinois, in accordance with the plans, specifications and conditions, plans and specifications, and providing for such improvement and on file with the Village Clerk of the village.

The estimated quantities of material are as follows:

- Special Assessment No. 5
- 233 cubic yards of earth
- 870 lineal feet of Portland curb and gutter

Proposals must be made on blank forms furnished by said Council and in compliance with instructions and specifications. Blanks can be had on application to the Village Clerk of Downers Grove. Each bid must be accompanied by cash or certified check payable to the order of Walter C. Barber, Village Clerk, in his official capacity, and be certified by a notary public for an amount not less than 10% of the aggregate of the bid proposal.

The bidder to whom the award shall be required to furnish a bond, as required by law, shall, when required by the Village Clerk, furnish with his bid, satisfactory evidence that he has the necessary facilities, experience, and financial resources to fulfill the conditions of his contract within the specified time.

Payment for all work will be made by special assessment bonds, which bonds shall be taken by the contractor at par.

The Council of the Village of Downers Grove, acting as the Board of Local Improvements, reserves the right to reject any or all bids should it deem it to be in the public good.

JOHN GOLLAN

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon, May 23, 1922 for John Gollan, who died at his home, 47 North Forest avenue, last Saturday, May 20, from pneumonia after but a weeks illness. The Rev. Arthur S. Phelps, pastor of the Congregational church read the service at the home. Four brother Masons sang "Nearer My God to Thee," and the local Masonic lodge then took charge.

John Gollan was born 61 years ago, October 20, 1860, in Blair of Altyre, Morayshire, Scotland. He was married to Jean Cummings, April 3, 1888. From this union five children were born, three of whom survive him with the mother. They are Katherine and Evan, of the Grove, and Alex, of Omaha, Nebraska.

April 17, 1888, two weeks after the marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Gollan came to America. They stayed in New York for several years and then moved to Chicago where Mr. Gollan worked as a florist until September, 1893, when the family moved to Downers Grove. In 1901 Mr. Gollan and Mr. Chas. V. Wolf opened the greenhouses here on the north side. Mr. Gollan purchased the business interests from Mr. Wolf in 1905 and has conducted the same ever since.

That he was loved and respected in the community was attested to by the number present at the services. His was without doubt one of the largest funerals ever seen in Downers Grove. The business men of the village, besides sending a beautiful floral piece, closed their doors for an hour in the afternoon and most of them attended. Besides his many other lodge brothers, close to one hundred Masons took part in the services. After reviewing the services at the home, the following is a list of those who attended:

Lodge, A. F. & A. M., read the service and Mr. E. L. Dickerson read the obituary. Mr. Chas. Knoblauch acted as marshal. John Gollan was buried with full Masonic honors. He became a member of the Blue Lodge in 1905 and was also a member of the Chapter, Eastern Star, Knights of Pythias and Royal League.

Besides the widow and children he leaves a host of friends in Downers Grove and elsewhere who mourn his loss and who will miss him. The sympathy of the entire community goes to the family in their bereavement for everyone knew John Gollan as a real friend.

The pallbearers were Chas. Mochel, W. F. Herrick, J. F. Kidwell, J. W. Graves, Samuel Johnstone and Walter Knox.
