

**DIFFICULT PLAY
BY SENIOR CLASS
JUNE 5th AND 6th**

"Under Cover," a Melodrama, to be Given at High School Next Monday and Tuesday.

The senior class of the high school will present the play, "Under Cover" next Monday and Tuesday nights in the high school. This play is a melodrama in four acts by Roi Cooper Megrue. The plot is concerned with the smuggling of a \$200,000 necklace thru the customs house by an American named Steven Denby. Denby is allowed to slip thru the customs by the inspectors and to go down Long Island with the Mrs. Michael Harrington, who is entertaining him over the week end. Much of the plot is staged at the Harrington's home. Miss Ethel Cartwright who is also a guest of the Harrington's proves to be an employee of the U. S. Secret Service, sent there to trap Denby. She tries to trap him as he at last falls for his wonderful attractiveness. The plot reaches a dramatic climax in the fourth act and one's idea of the outcome of the story is entirely smashed. The play throughout is full of intensely dramatic lines with plenty of exciting action accompanied by burglar alarms and revolver shots.

As is true of all the plays written by Roi Cooper Megrue, her descriptions of the characters in the play are very vivid. Her description of the three leading characters follows: Daniel Taylor, deputy surveyor of the customs house at New York, is an incisive, smart, bull-doggy sort of man, typical of the surliness of a certain well known kind of government official. He is a bully, catering to his superiors, and ragging his inferiors. He has much authority, force and menace. Miss Ethel Cartwright is a tall, very pretty woman of twenty-seven, and while her manner is one of extreme pose that comes from perfect breeding, and the almost unconscious knowledge that she is what she is, none the less she is very much of a girl. She has a great deal of charm and a decided sense of humor; she is loyal and plucky. Physically she is the sort of a woman who when she enters a room, other people say "Who is that?" and mentally she is the kind that men love and women criticize; and the one's love and the other's criticism are alike a matter of indifference to her.

Dona Forriy Flush Gives 468.8 lbs. of Milk in Seven Day Record Test.

Lisle Farms Co., of Lisle, Ill., are again mentioned in the official bulletin of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America, published bi-weekly by Malcolm H. Gardner, of Delavan, Wis., which reports the milk and butter production of cows under official supervision.

The purebred registered Holstein-Friesian cow, Dona Forriy Flush, is reported as having made at the age of two years and eight months, a record of 468.8 lbs. of milk and 18.821 lbs. of butter fat, in seven days, equivalent to 23.5 lbs. of butter.

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
