**KU KLUX KLAN KLEANS STORES OF PLAINFIELD**

No. Gas, No Oil, No Eats in Village After Klansmen Leave Following Ceremony.

The little village of Plainfield, situated in the north part of Will county, is recovering from a visit of the Ku Klux Klansmen from all parts of the state Saturday night. The Klan held a big initiation ceremony—near Plainfield Saturday night and Sunday morning not a drop of gasoline or oil could be found. All ham, cheese and similar picnic commodities were gone from the shelves of grocery stores. For the first time in its history Plainfield was an "all night" town, every one staying open until Sunday morning reaping the harvest of coin.

A description of the ceremony following, was clipped from the Aurora Beacon-News. The cloak of mystery surrounding the Ku Klux Klan was penetrated Saturday night by newspapermen at the invitation of local members of the organization.

After a ride which wound thru dirt roads off the main traveled highways the leading machine halted, sounded the horn and two men stepped from bushes at the side of the road. The password was given and the caravan turned into a lane at Fraser's woods.

White robed pickets lined the lane. Each automobile was carefully inspected and the occupants asked for the password.
