COMMUNITY HIGH SCHOOL ELECTION SET FOR JUNE 24th

The high school is a necessary part of the American School system. It is the people's college. It has come to stay. By combining in the proposed high school district better results will be achieved at less expense than if each section tried to maintain its own little high school.

Organization of a Community High School District will leave the present districts in better shape to attend to their grade schools—schools which are of vital importance.

The territory in the proposed Community High School District is growing rapidly and can well support a High School in which proper attention can be paid to the needs of every pupil in the districts involved.

The area covered by the proposed plan contains all the contiguous territory not yet embraced in other high school districts or proposed high school districts. Roughly it is three miles east and west, and six miles north and south. It is bounded on the north by York Township (about half a mile north of the present village limits); on the west by the proposed Lisle High School District (roughly about half a mile west of the Belmont road); on the south by the Lemont High School District (the Joliet road); and on the east by the Hinsdale High School District (the old Gregga road, now Cass avenue, Westmont).
