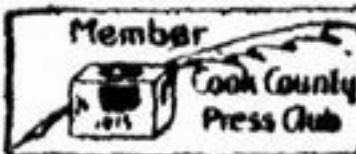

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SCOUT COURT OF HONOR HELD LAST TUESDAY EVENING

C. E. Palmer Elected to Succeed Mr. W. W. Heintz as Deputy Commissioner.

At the Boy Scout Court of Honor, Tuesday evening, certificates were presented by Mr. S. W. Fuller, examiner in Pathfinding and Cooking, showing that John Stoops of Troop 2 had successfully completed the tests in Cooking and Pathfinding; and Richard Kellogg completed the Cooking test. Mr. W. W. Heintz presented his certificate showing that Carl Reible had completed his Safety First test. These tests were not satisfactorily passed at last month's Court of Honor but the fact that the scouts "stuck" to it until they had mastered the subjects is one for which they are to be commended.

Mr. E. G. Lemon, examiner in Bird Study, passed George Ray in that subject with a grade of 100 per cent.

Mr. Fuller examined and passed Carl Riehl and Donald Towsley in Pathfinding.

Mr. W. H. Ray, examiner in First Aid to Animals, heard Carl Riehl's test in that subject.

Mr. Robert MacDougall passed Carl Riehl in Automobiling. This is the first time that Mr. MacDougall has served on the board of examiners and his services were greatly appreciated by the Court.

Mr. H. S. Paine, examiner of Music and Scholarship, gave his official OK to Donald Towsley's application for Scholarship merit badge.

Mr. W. D. Herrick examined Carl Riehl in Poultry Keeping and gave him a high grade.

Mr. C. Edway Palmer inspected the library table and the draft of same made by Scout Donald Towsley and graded them highly satisfactory for the Craftwork in the Wood test.

Scouts Blaklee and Adams of Troop 3 were re-examined for their First Class tests before the Court of Honor and made such a satisfactory showing that they received the special congratulations of the examiner and the Court. They were also given the Scouts' cheers when they joined their troop in the school gym after completing the tests.

The Court and Local Council Council wish to express their appreciation of the help given by the examiners.

The Local Council meeting was held after Court and a committee of Scoutmasters, F. N. Wildish, W. J. O'Neill and Asst. C. Edway Palmer were appointed to carry the log cabin plans to completion by this fall if possible. As soon as more trees can be marked by Preserve Supervisor Littleford the building will proceed.

Mr. Palmer was elected Deputy Commissioner, vice W. W. Heintz, who was elected one of the Court of Honor's permanent members. Mr. Spencer Fuller, Mr. W. D. Herrick and Vice-President H. S. Paine were also elected Court of Honor members. These men will aid in giving tests and help Chairman Geo. Prickett to secure other examiners.

DAY OF GAYETY IN SICILY

At Festival Time the People Give Themselves Up to All Forms of Amusement.

Booths and barrows lined the streets selling fireworks and drinks, torrone made of new almonds and honey, knives and ribbons; and alternating with the merchandise and drinks were the gambling stands. There were a dozen roulette tables, silver horses whirling around over the numbered courses where you put your solts, and bright arrows with painted feathers that stopped whirling sooner or later and left a light tip resting on the lucky number. Crowds of people were putting their money down, mostly little boys, it seemed, writes Stark Young in the North American Review. The rockets were firing from every direction, with reports like bombs, unbelievably loud, to appease the Sicilian liking for mere noise. Now and then firecrackers in bunches were thrown from the roofs of the churches into the little stone streets, with a rattling and detonation like a bombardment. Beside the Duomo the band from Syracuse was playing airs from the operas. Meantime the deep blue of the early night had fallen over the walls and over the country dropping down toward the sea and rising on the other hand toward the Saracen castle above the town. A few pale stars were out and a slender moon, almost past, was shining. The whole piazza was sweet with the perfume of the jessamine that ran along the front of the house next the church, incredible sweetness in that soft, blue air. And everywhere were the voices, deep and bright.
