**CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY ON JUNE 30th**

Big Meeting of Illinois Farmers Will be Held at DeKalb, on the Last of June.

Ten years ago an idea was born in Illinois. As an infant it was first nourished in two Northern Illinois counties. The youngster has grown to be such a husky chap that he now holds sway in 95 of the 102 counties in Illinois. His name is Farm Bureau.

On the last day of June thousands of Illinois farmers are going to celebrate this birthday of ten years ago. The big event will be held at DeKalb, Illinois, on the beautiful campus of the Northern Illinois State Teachers' College.

On this picturesque spot will be staged a big pageant portraying the farm bureau development during its ten years of existence. More than 1500 farm people are in the cast.

Such a large audience is expected that large amplifiers will be erected so that the voice of speakers and actors can be heard clearly anywhere on the natural auditorium grounds.

A complete and up-to-minute radio outfit will be in action and visitors will be allowed to listen in freely to the "music of the air", the market reports, or other special messages.

**BOY GETS B. S. DEGREE AT ILLINOIS**

Exercises Held June 14 at Which 1156 Degrees Were Conferred in DuPage.

Burr S. Eichelman received his B. S. degree at the university of Illinois Wednesday, June 14 among 1156 degrees conferred, eleven of which went to students from DuPage County.

This year's class was the largest in the history of the university, and perhaps the largest of any institution in the world. The number graduating did not include the graduates from the university's college of medicine, college of dentistry and school of pharmacy, located in Chicago, commencement exercises for which were held in Chicago. Unlike some other institutions, the University of Illinois does not have extension or correspondence courses. All graduates therefore fulfilled their requirements for graduation as bona fide resident students.

**UNORGANIZED**

**FARMER BLAMED BY MR. A. SAPIRO**

Co-operative Attorney Talked at the Milk Producers Meeting in Chicago.

It is the unorganized farmer who is at fault for the costly and wasteful speculative system now prevailing in the marketing of many agricultural commodities, Aaron Sapiro, famous cooperative attorney, told the milk producers of the Chicago district in six addresses last week.

Mr. Sapiro has helped to organize forty-seven cooperative farmers' marketing associations, all of which have been successful.

"Don't blame the speculator," he said. "He is the natural result of the lack of organization in agriculture. What would you think if each one of the forty thousand stock holders in one of the large meat packing companies would begin selling meat products independently of all the other stockholders? That is exactly what is happening in unorganized agriculture today. Is it any wonder that agriculture in many cases has not been receiving the price it deserved for its products?"

"If farming is to be a successful business the farmer must organize along business lines and market his own product just as efficiently as other manufacturers."
