ORDINANCE NO. 15
An Ordinance making Appropriations in and for Downers Grove Sanitary District, located in the County of DuPage and State of Illinois, for the Fiscal Year from May 1, 1922, to April 30, 1923.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Board of Trustees of the Downers Grove Sanitary District:

SECTION 1: That the following sums or so much thereof as may be authorized by law, be and the same are, hereby appropriated for corporate purposes of the Downers Grove Sanitary District, as hereinafter specified, for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1922, and ending April 30, 1923:

Treasurer's Salary	\$ 300.00
Salaries of the Board of Trustees	300.00
Attorney Fees	600.00
Engineering services	1,000.00
Clerk's office expenses, stationery and supplies	295.00
For the care and maintenance of the Disposal works, outlet ditches and sewers	2,500.00
For interest on bonded indebtedness	4,275.00
For sinking fund to retire bonds maturing August 15, 1923	7,500.00
Total	\$16,770.00

SECTION 2: All unexpended balances of any item or items, of any general appropriation made by this Ordinance, may be expended in making up any insufficiency in any item or items in the same general appropriation and for the same general purpose, or in a like appropriation made by this Ordinance.

SECTION 3: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.
