

FASHION DECREES THAT WOMAN MUST LOOK TO COIFFURE

The Beauty of Woman is Marred by the Incorrect Dressing of Her Hair.

"The glory of a woman is her hair."

So declared Solomon whose reputation as a connoisseur in feminine loveliness was equal to his fame as the wisest of men.

Fashion experts of today, assembled in convention in Chicago, agreed with the ancient king but they declared that to be a woman's glory, her hair must be arranged with an art that counterfeits nature.

"Nothing," said a beauty specialist at this national gathering, "is so conspicuous in a woman as her hair. Gown, toque, lingerie, jewels have each their separate appeal to the eye. But their combined effectiveness is destroyed if the coiffure is incorrect.

"The hair must be arranged with careful carelessness. It must have the appearance of unstudied naturalness. The mechanics of the coiffure must not be noticeable. Hair nets, pins, and other contrivances for holding the hair in place must not show. The prettiness of a coiffure is lost in evidence of artificiality.

"On a correctly gowned and beautiful woman a double-mesh hair net plainly visible is a tragedy. It is a detail out of drawing in the picture, a discord in the music. It has an air of cheapness. Its only excuse is its durability but who wants durable ugliness?"

The Shapes of Eggs.

An expert recently entertained the Zoological Society of London with a mathematical discussion of the differences in the shape of eggs. A few eggs, like those of the owl and the tortoise, are spherical or nearly so; a few, like the geese's or the cornucopia's, are elliptical, with symmetrical ends; the great majority, like the hen's, are oval, or blunter at one end than at the other.

The hen's eggs are always laid blunt end foremost. Eggs which are the most unsymmetrical are also eggs of large size relatively to the parent birds. The yolks of eggs are spherical, whatever the form of the entire egg may be. This is shown to be due to their being enclosed in a fluid, the "white," which makes the pressure everywhere on the surface of the yolk practically constant.

Bret Harte. American poet and novelist, was born at Albany, N. Y., August 25, 1839. While a youth he went to California, where, several years later he founded the Overland Monthly in San Francisco. In 1860 he was made professor of recent literature in the University of California, but resigned and returned to New York the following year. He was United States consul at Oxford, Germany, 1878-80, and at Glasgow, 1880-85, and afterward lived in England. SLANDER SUIT SETTLED OUT OF COURT

The case of Dr. W. W. Gourley against the Rev. Eneas B. Goodwin came on for trial in the Circuit Court of DuPage County, before Judge Slusser and a jury, on June 15, 1922. The plaintiff, Dr. W. W. Gourley was represented by F. C. Barbour, John W. Leedle and G. H. Bunge, while the defendant was represented by attorneys John Newhall of Aurora, G. B. Anderson of Chicago and J. A. Reuss of Naperville. After a jury had been selected a conference was held, by the attorneys for both parties, with the result that Dr. Gourley agreed to dismiss the suit upon the performance of certain conditions on the part of the defendant, to which the defendant and his attorneys agreed, whereupon the suit was dismissed.

The conditions forming the basis of the dismissal of the suit are set forth at length in the following letter which was signed by the Rev. Eneas B. Goodwin and his attorney and which letter was read by Judge Slusser in open Court.

Wheaton, Ill., June 15, 1922 To All Whom it May Concern: Whereas, it is reported to me that certain persons in Downers Grove, say that they are of the opinion that

on Sunday, the 25th day of September, A. D. 1921, during the early morning service of St. Joseph's church in Downers Grove, of which I was then and am now the pastor, I made certain statements derogatory to Dr. W. W. Gourley, also of Downers Grove, in his professional capacity and otherwise; I feel it my duty to both Dr. Gourley and myself to say that I did not make such derogatory statements; that in no remarks by me made on that occasion did I have Dr. Gourley in mind, nor did I refer to him nor intend to refer to him. From inquiries I have made from among those present on that occasion I do not think that many persons could have believed from any statement that I made that I referred to Dr. Gourley. At any rate I regret that any one at all should have gained the impression that I intended by my remarks to refer to Dr. Gourley, and it is with pleasure that I write this letter to the end of correcting, as far as possible, such impression which might or may have existed.

I further wish to assure all whom it may concern that if any language

used by me on said occasion was susceptible of a construction derogatory to the integrity, standing or morality of Dr. Gourley, that it was not so intended, nor would it have had

any foundation in fact. I hold Dr. Gourley in high regard. (Signed) Eneas B. Goodwin. (Signed) G. Bernhard Anderson, Attorney.

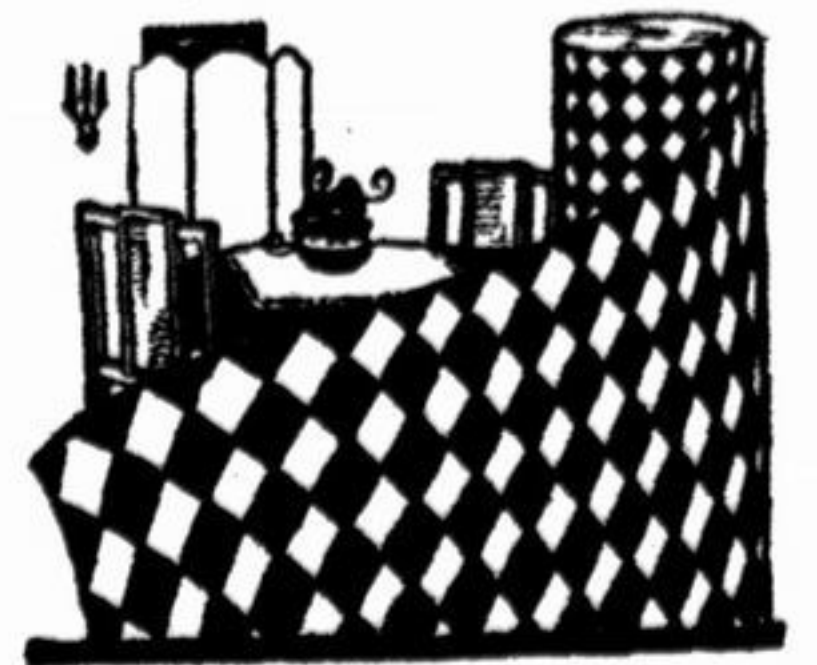
