**DISPOSAL PLANT IS PROGRESSING**

Engineer E. D. Otto Makes Interesting Report to Trustees of the Sanitary District.

Following is a very interesting report made by Edgar D. Otto, engineer for the Downers Grove Sanitary District, to the trustees of the district. It shows very satisfactory progress has been made in what will be one of the best sewage disposal plants in this part of the state.

The following report may be of interest to you concerning progress of construction on our Sewage Disposal Plant.

Mr. Wm. F. Hildemann started the work as soon as the weather and other conditions would permit and has been giving his personal attention to the work.

The 24 inch outfall sewer, together with the two concrete structures for carrying the sewer over the creek at two points, was completed some time ago, but owing to the very wet weather in the spring he could not get started on the disposal works as his materials could not be hauled thru the fields until we had provided him with a road. We now have constructed a gravel road from the Belmont road to the site of the Disposal Works and the contractor has just completed the bridge over the creek, so that he can now get all necessary materials and should make uninterrupted progress. He has been taking precautions to have a good supply of cement on hand and as all other concrete materials are being hauled in by trucks there should be no occasion to shut down the work even in the event of a railroad strike or prolonged coal strike.

All excavation and concrete walls for the sprinkling filter are now finished; the floor and drainage system are being started and should be finished before our regular meeting in July.

The pump house and dosing tank are about 75% complete.

The excavation for sludge bed and secondary settling tank is about all done.

The excavation for the main settling tank is about half completed and work is now being started on the walls for this structure. As this is over thirty feet deep it is intended to sink it by the open caisson method; this is by far the most difficult part of the whole job.

Buschmann Bros. have completed their contract for changing the course of the creek at the plant site and water is now flowing in the new channel.

Mr. H. H. Woelfersheim is on the work as inspector and his past experience as a contractor should be of considerable assistance to Mr. Hildemann and also assures us of a first class job.

Work has been progressing satisfactorily since the Trustees inspection last Sunday and I will be pleased to continue showing you over the work every week.
