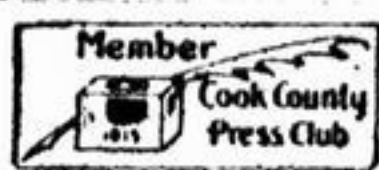

**"BUSCH BARKING UP THE
 WRONG TREE"**

The following editorial was taken
 from The Illinois Miner, official or-
 gan of the miners' unions of the
 state. It is worth reading and worth
 thinking about.

Adolphus Busch, senior survivor of
 the Anheuser-Busch Budweiser dyn-

asty, has joined the prohibition en-
 forcement forces.

He accuses Uncle Sam of bootleg-
 ging because real, instead of near-
 budweiser is sold on the passenger
 boats controlled by the U S Shipping
 Board.

Worse and moreover, this real, five
 per cent budweiser is brewed by our
 late enemies. Whereas, Adolphus, as
 a hundred per cent American, is only
 allowed to brew budweiser contain-
 ing less than one-half per cent of
 alcoholic blues.

One would think that one hundred
 per cent American budweiser would
 put it all over five per cent "Hun"
 budweiser. But Adolphus says that
 the legal home brew of our native
 land can not compete with the real
 stuff made in Germany.
