On that date the DuPage county Farm Bureau will strive to make all and sundry enjoy themselves to the limit of their capacity, for the annual farm bureau picnic will be on and everybody will be happy.

The thirty-five piece band of the St. Charles Home for Boys will be there, just as big as, and better than they were last year at the State Fair. They will awake the echoes of the forest at 9:30 in the morning — good old farmers' time. After a half hour of real music, the races will be pulled off.
