DU PAGE COUNTY FOLK TOOK PART IN CELEBRATION

Two Scenes in Pageant Put on by State Farm Bureau Were Acted by People from DuPage

DuPage county farm folk played their parts in true professional style at the Farm Bureau Decennial at De Kalb last Friday. This county was represented by about sixty carloads loaded to the doors.

The Naperville Rural Life club, who were largely instrumental in putting on two of the scenes, were especially in evidence. C. J. Rieck, Test Supervisor of the County Cow Testing Association, with a live bunch of Calf club boys, showed the world that our young farmers were interested in the Holstein calf. Mrs. W. W. Klett, of Naperville, with her large class of canning and sewing club members, the Busy Workers—made a pretty picture as they marched across the stage. The Cow Testing demonstration conducted by Mr. Rieck with real cows milked by two pretty Naperville Dairy Maids, made a good picture of real farm bureau work, with its group of interested DuPage County men watching the testing of the milk.

Howard Leonard, I. A. A. President; James R. Howard, President of the American Farm Bureau Federation; Eugene Davenport, ex-dean of the College of Agriculture of the University of Illinois, and Gov. J. A. O. Preus, of Minnesota, gave addresses. Ex-Governor Frank O. Lowden, of Illinois, was to have spoken but was prevented by showers which blew up at the noon hour.

Motion pictures were taken of the pageant itself and some day all who were not there may get a chance to see how well their neighbors played their part in this greatest event ever staged by farmers anywhere.

Early English History.
The reason that the Norman conquest did not subjugate the English is explained by the fact that "Jutes, Angles, Saxons, Danes and Normans" were all kindred in race and so they united in one race; the Welsh, Irish and Scots were of the Celtic race. The Normans were not Frenchmen in the beginning but pirates from Scandinavia who had come to France and had been given a tract of land. They adopted the French language and became in time the most courteous and noble people in Europe, but when they won the battle of Hasting, they were more nearly akin to the English or Anglo-Saxons than to the French, although they brought the French language to England, and many of their words were incorporated into the language. Because of racial differences the Welsh, Irish and Scotch did not unite with the English as easily, but the centuries have obliterated many racial characteristics because of many intermarriages.
