Sealed bids will be received by the Village Council acting as the Board of Local Improvements for the Village of Downers Grove, DuPage County, Illinois, until 8 o'clock p. m. on the 17th day of July, 1922, for furnishing all material and labor and constructing a concrete pavement with the necessary curb and gutter, storm water drains and inlets, in Summit Street; Webster Street; Church Street and Randall Street in the Village of Downers Grove, DuPage County, Illinois, in accordance with the ordinances, plans and specifications providing for such improvement and now on file with the Village Clerk of said Village.

The estimated quantities of material are as follows:

800 lineal feet of 10 inch storm water drain.
150 lineal feet of 10 inch storm and water drain.

The bidder to whom the work is awarded shall be required to furnish a bond as required by law, and any bidder, when required by said Council, shall furnish them with satisfactory evidence that he has the necessary facilities, experience, ability and financial resources to fulfill the conditions of his contract within the time specified.

Payment for all work will be made by special assessment bonds bearing interest at the rate of 6% per annum, which bonds shall be taken by the contractor at par.
