TWO LOCAL MEN MEET AND TRAVEL THROUGH GERMANY

(Continued from Page 1) in carriages. Two hours' service for the two of us costs 60 marks, or 18 cents.

Sunday we went to Coblenz. Leaving at 6:30 in the morning we traveled by rail to Mainz. There we embarked on a Rhine steamer and at the cost of 45c apiece sailed down the river until 2 o'clock, passing Bingen, the Rat Tower, the Lorelei, Rudesheim with its terraced vineyards, dozens of picturesque ruins on the heights and finally came to the huge pile of Ehrenbreitstein with the American flag floating from its towers. We talked with several American soldiers and they told us there were thousands of our people passing thru the city; they can scarcely walk down the streets without being hailed by some visitor. They also said they hated to think of leaving but we had already concluded that for ourselves; we did see a few of our soldiers out walking unaccompanied by pretty German girls, but they were mighty few.

That evening we returned to Frankfurt by train and passed through territory occupied by soldiers from

French Africa. The German feeling against the blacks runs very high and every one has tales of atrocities to tell, under his breath.

And so it goes. We are visiting places and seeing things that we shall always remember for their beauty, their quaintness and their historical association.

Many times as we roll about our pockets bulging with oodles of marks, feeling like blooming millionaires we say, "Gosh, if only the boys in Downers Grove could see us now!" The other evening as we sat at a table in the Palmengarten listening to the music we filled the chairs about us in our imagination, with folks from the Grove and had all sorts of amusement as we pictured the surprise and delight if one or another could be with us.

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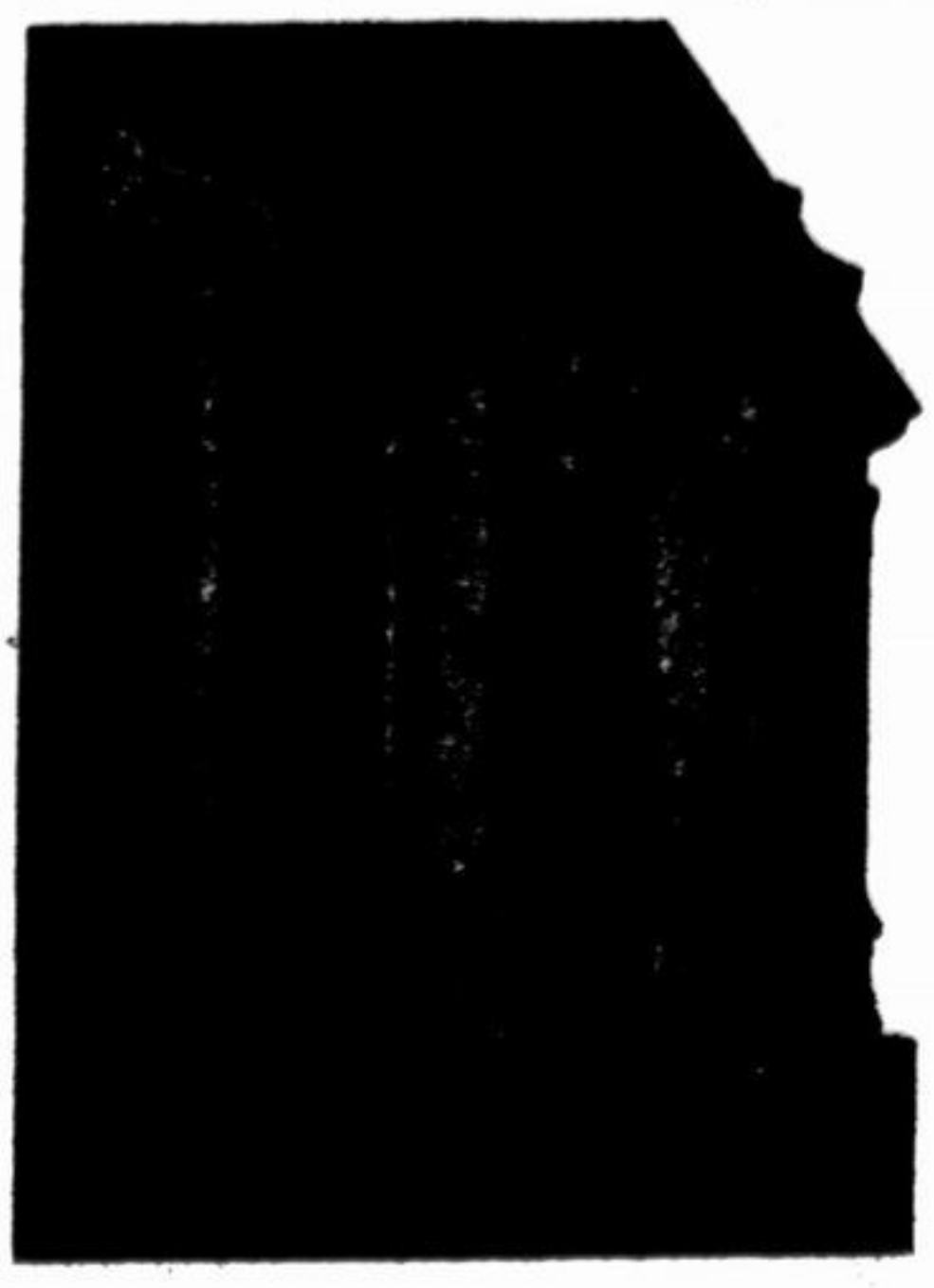
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
