Sealed bids will be received by the Village Council acting as the Board of Local Improvements for the Village of Downers Grove, DuPage County, Illinois, until 8 o'clock p. m. on the 17th day of July, 1922, for furnishing all material and labor and constructing a concrete pavement with the necessary curb and gutter, storm water drains, and inlets, in Summit Street; Webster Street; Church Street and Randall Street in the Village of Downers Grove, DuPage County, Illinois, in accordance with the ordinances, plans and specifications providing for such improvement and now on file with the Village Clerk of said Village.
The estimated quantities of material are as follows:

- Special Assessment No. 59
- 800 lineal feet of 10 inch storm water drain.
- 150 lineal feet of 10 inch storm and water drain.
- 2 brick man holes.
- 10 storm and surface water inlets.
- 2 inlets adjusted to grade.
- 4200 lineal feet of curb and gutter
- 2270 cubic yards of excavation for roadway.
- 600 cubic yards of excavation for parkways.
- 6 cast iron man hole covers brought to grade.
- 5040 square yards of concrete pavement.

Proposals must be made out on blank forms furnished by said Village Council and in compliance with the instructions and specifications. Said blanks can be had on application to the Village Clerk of Downers Grove. Each bid must be accompanied by cash or certified check payable to the order of Walter C. Barber, Mayor of said Village, in his official capacity, and be certified by a responsible bank, for an amount not less than 10% of the aggregate of the endorsed proposal.
The bidder to whom the work is awarded shall be required to furnish a bond as required by law, and

any bidder, when required by said Council, shall furnish them with satisfactory evidence that he has the necessary facilities, experience, ability and financial resources to fulfill the conditions of his contract within the time specified.

Payment for all work will be made by special assessment bonds bearing interest at the rate of 6% per annum, which bonds shall be taken by the contractor at par.

The Council of the Village of Downers Grove, acting as the Board of Local Improvements reserves the right to reject any or all proposals or bids should it deem it best for the public good.
