

COUNTY BOARD MET IN SPECIAL SESSION FRIDAY

Report of the Hard Road Committee Was Accepted—Chairman Fix Presided.

The Board of Supervisors of DuPage County met in special session at Wheaton last Friday, July 28, to consider mainly the report of the Hard Roads Committee, which was accepted.

The Committee consists of Supervisors N. W. Lies, Wm. Hamerschmidt and A. D. Miller.

Following is the report: To the Honorable Members of the Board of Supervisors, DuPage County, Illinois:

The Committee on Hard Roads would respectfully report as follows: That settlement be made with Pfund Nursery Company for land taken, \$200; and damages to lands not taken, \$300; a total of \$500; in changing the course of Salt Creek on Bond Issue Route 5 (Lake Street).

That settlement be made with Wesley Shield for land taken, \$50; for damages to land not taken and improvements thereon and moving fences, \$400; a total of \$450; in acquiring part of land necessary for Bond Issue Route 18 (Liste Township).

That settlement be made with Sittler Heirs for land taken and for moving fences for \$200 on Wheaton-Naperville State Aid Road.

That settlement be made with Sarah and Frank Morrison for land taken (1.18 acres) for \$425 and for moving fences and damage to adjoining land for \$200; a total of \$625, on Bond Issue Route 18.

That settlement be made with Henry Brummel for land taken and damages to lands not taken for \$100 (and a certain culvert built) on Bond Issue Route 18.

That Albert Lacey be paid \$100 for soil to make a fill at borrow pit near Lisle station on Bond Issue Road, Route 18.

That Joseph A. Reuss be paid \$50 for money advances to pay Alois Senft for land taken for Bond Issue Road, Route 18.

That George Diehl be paid \$600 for land taken and damages to adjacent lands and for moving fences and that in case he does not accept such offer, condemnation be begun to secure such lands, as shown on plan of route 18, Bond Issue Road, through his lands.

That Branigar Brothers have refused committee's offer of \$800 for land taken and damages to adjacent lands and moving fences and have submitted a counter offer of \$3000 therefor. The committee recommends that condemnation be begun to secure such lands as shown on plan of Route 5, Bond Issue Road, thru such lands.

That contract with John Awe for moving soil from Lacey lands for borrow pit (fill) at 30c per cubic yard (2158 yards) be approved.

Obemen sisters be paid \$325 for land taken and damages to adjoining lands and building fences and if not accepted, condemnation be begun to secure new channel as shown by plan of State Road 5 through their property.

That the Town of Naperville be paid \$138 for money advanced for Newman damages on Route 18.

That Christ & May Weisbrook be paid \$100 for land taken and damaged to land not taken.

The following bills and claims were also allowed:

The Porter claim for \$2116.53 was allowed and ordered paid out of the County Highway fund.

John F. Hesterman, County Collector, was allowed credits by abatements of the 1921 tax in the amount in abatement list filed in the County Clerk's office.

COUNTY "Y" BOYS TO CAMP AT FISH LAKE AND DUNES

Boys 12 to 15 go to Dunes Aug. 21. Older Boys to Camp Duncan August 29th.

Chas. A. Caster, County "Y" Secretary, has arranged for vacation camps for the boys of DuPage County, one on the Dunes for boys from 12 to 15 years, beginning August 21 and ending August 25. The Older boys, over 15, will camp at Camp Duncan, Fish Lake.

The purpose of the camp is to provide a vacation for the boys of the county under the best available leadership. "Character is caught rather than taught." To encourage the boys of the various communities in forming real friendships. This helps in promoting clean athletics. To build character by playing and working together. At camp boys learn to live a live normal Christian life.

The younger boys will go by boat to Michigan City, Indiana and pitch camp near the lake, in the Dunes, about four miles from the city.

The older boys, through the courtesy of the West Side Y. M. C. A., of Chicago, will use the new camp equipment on Fish Lake, about forty miles north of Chicago, near the village of Round Lake on the C. M. & St. P. railroad. It is also near the Waukegan-Belvidere pike. Both of these are splendid camp sites and the committee feels very fortunate to secure such fine camping places.

Any boy in DuPage county who is willing to play the team game; to do his share of the camp duties; to smile and help everybody have a good time; and who has the consent of his parents may attend who is within the requirements.

Every boy should send in a registration card and fee of \$1.00 as soon as possible, at least five days before the opening of camp. The younger boys will pay \$5.00 additional. This will include a round trip on the boat from Chicago to Michigan City, hauling his baggage from the boat to camp and back, tent rent, board and all camp privileges. The older boys will pay \$7.00 additional. This includes hauling the baggage from Round Lake to camp and back, board and the use of all equipment, such as tents, boats, balls and all other camp privileges. The eats will be good. All that the boys pay will be spent in the camp.

Every boy should bring three heavy double blankets or comforters. The nights may be cool. Also soap, towel, comb, tooth brush and paste, handkerchiefs, pajamas, change of socks and undergarments, notebook, pencil, a New Testament and a good disposition. Wear old clothes. In addition younger boys should bring knife, fork, spoon, cup, bowl, plate and a poncho or a piece of oilcloth. We will sleep on the sand.

The following program will be used in general in both camps:

- 6:30—Reveille, setting up exercises.
6:40—Morning dip.
7:00—Breakfast.
7:30—Camp police.
8:15—Tent inspection.
8:30 Bible discussion by groups.
9:00—Games, hikes, talks, etc.
11:00—Swimming.
12:00—Dinner.
12:30—Quiet hour.
1:30—Team games, etc.
4:30—Swimming.
6:00—Supper.
7:00—Group games.
8:00—Camp fire program.



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9:00—Tattoo. All to bed. 9:30—Taps. Everyone quiet, no snoring.

The success or failure of camp depends on leadership rather than equipment. A number of good men are being secured to take charge of the various activities, such as swimming, games, hikes, Bible study, camp fire programs, etc. A number of business men will come in to spend the night and bring us a message out of their experience.

Each community sending five or more boys should furnish an adult leader. Both camps will be in charge of Mr. Caster.

Each camp will have a council made up of the adult leaders and representative boys chosen by the boys themselves. This council will have charge of the program, discipline, etc.

There will be a few camp rules. Everyone is expected to do his best. No one will be allowed to go into the water, to use the boats or to leave the grounds without permission of his adult leader or the camp director. There will be no place in camp for tobacco or fire arms.

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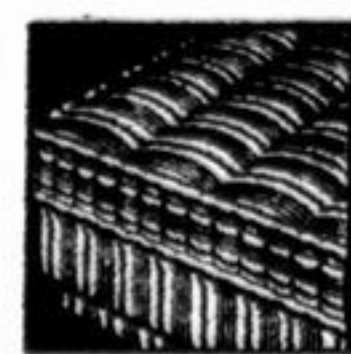
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
