## PLAINFIELD TO AURORA HIGHWAY PLEA WAS HEARD

DuPage and Will Counties Argued For Old North Route—Kessinger Argued For Aurora.

At a meeting in the Tiger room of the Sherman hotel, Chicago, Wednesday Senator Harold C. Kessinger presented arguments to the Illinois state road commission favoring the paving of state road No. 32, the Lincoln Highway stretch between Aurora and Plainfield, in place of the old north route which leads due north out of the latter city.

It was pointed out by Senator Kessinger that outside of the fact that the Lincoln Highway is the shorter and is already the marked trail, Kendall county, 90 per cent agricultural, is entitled to a road leading into Aurora. The county has the least mileage of hard roads of any in the northern part of the state. The farmers should have a paved highway for bringing their produce to Aurora or south into Joliet, it was affirmed.

DuPage and Will counties had representatives who argued in favor of the old north route. The highway department will fix the road definitely in the near future and work should

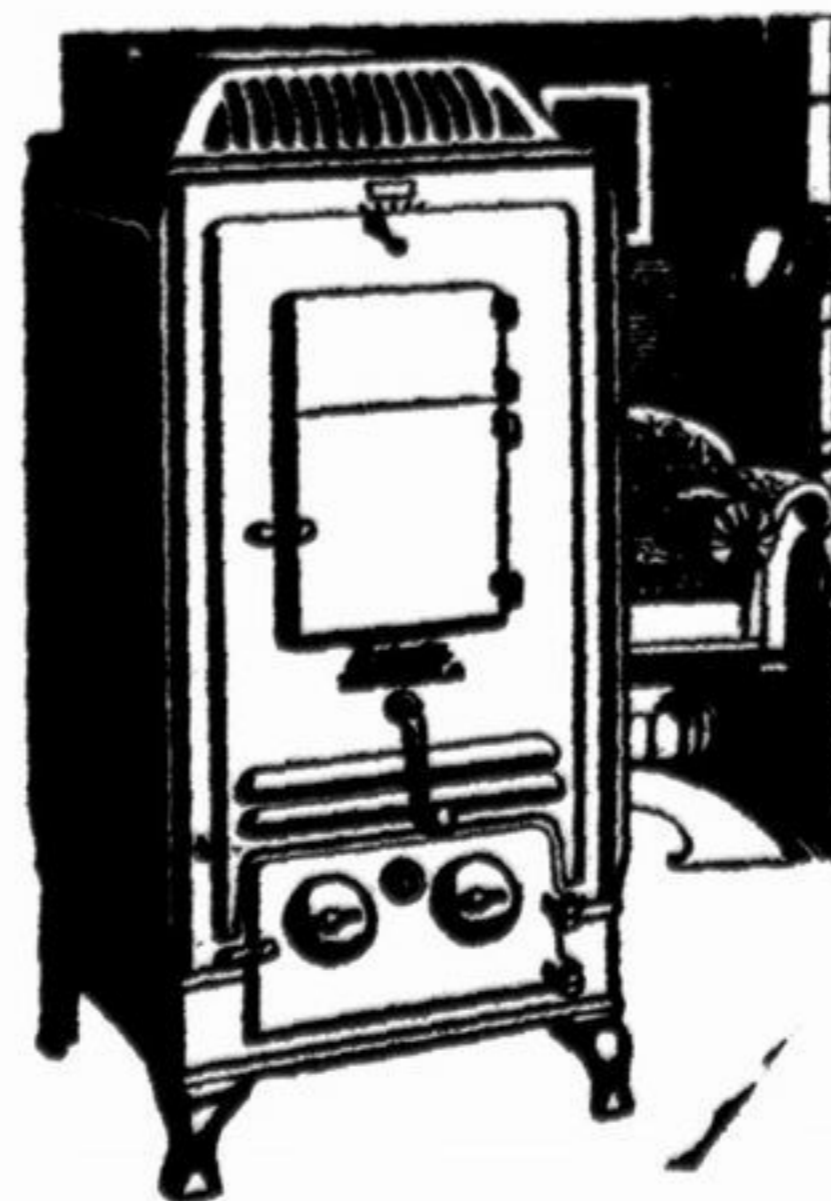
