PREVENT OUTBREAKS OF INJURIOUS PEST

Control Webworms in Corn by Cultural Methods.

After Crop is Once Planted and Field is Found to be Infested There is No Practicable Way of Getting Rid of Them.

Outbreaks of webworms in corn in the Middle Eastern states can be prevented only by cultural methods according to the bureau of entomology of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Summer or very early fall plowing should be practiced. Plowing in late October or November has little effect because the worms are already in their winter webs under the surface of the ground.

Grasslands of all kinds—meadows, pastures, or lawns—furnish the normal food of sod webworms, but they also gnaw young corn plants below the surface and deform them so as to prevent the production of grain.

Disking in the spring, the application of fertilizer, and the sowing of seed are the chief preventive measures that will have any effect.

POISON BAITS WILL KILL OFF CUTWORMS

White Arsenic or Paris Green Will Prove Efficient.

Insects Are Especially Fond of Tomatoes, Cabbage, Lettuce and Other Vegetables—They Are Voracious Feeders.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Cutworms can readily be controlled by the use of poisoned bait, the United States Department of Agriculture has demonstrated.

To one bushel of dry bran add one pound of white arsenic or paris green and mix thoroughly into a mash with four gallons of water.

Their method of attack is to cut off the young plants near the ground. They are of large size and are voracious feeders, capable of destroying many plants in a single night.
