

CURFEW FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

With the coming of school the following, sent out by the Illinois Department of Health, is valuable advice.

Medical authorities agree that school children need the following amount of sleep:

AUTO DRIVER MUST TAKE CARE IN CITY

Law Regulates Traffic in Streets for the Protection of the Public.

Special provision is made by law for the regulation of automobile traffic in cities and every city has its own additional regulations.

"Under the law, an automobile must not approach closer than ten feet behind a street car which is loading or unloading passengers," he continued.

Too much reliance should not be placed in the use of the automobile horn in city streets. The machine should be operated at a speed which permits stopping within a few feet in case pedestrians do not heed the signal and walk in front of the car.

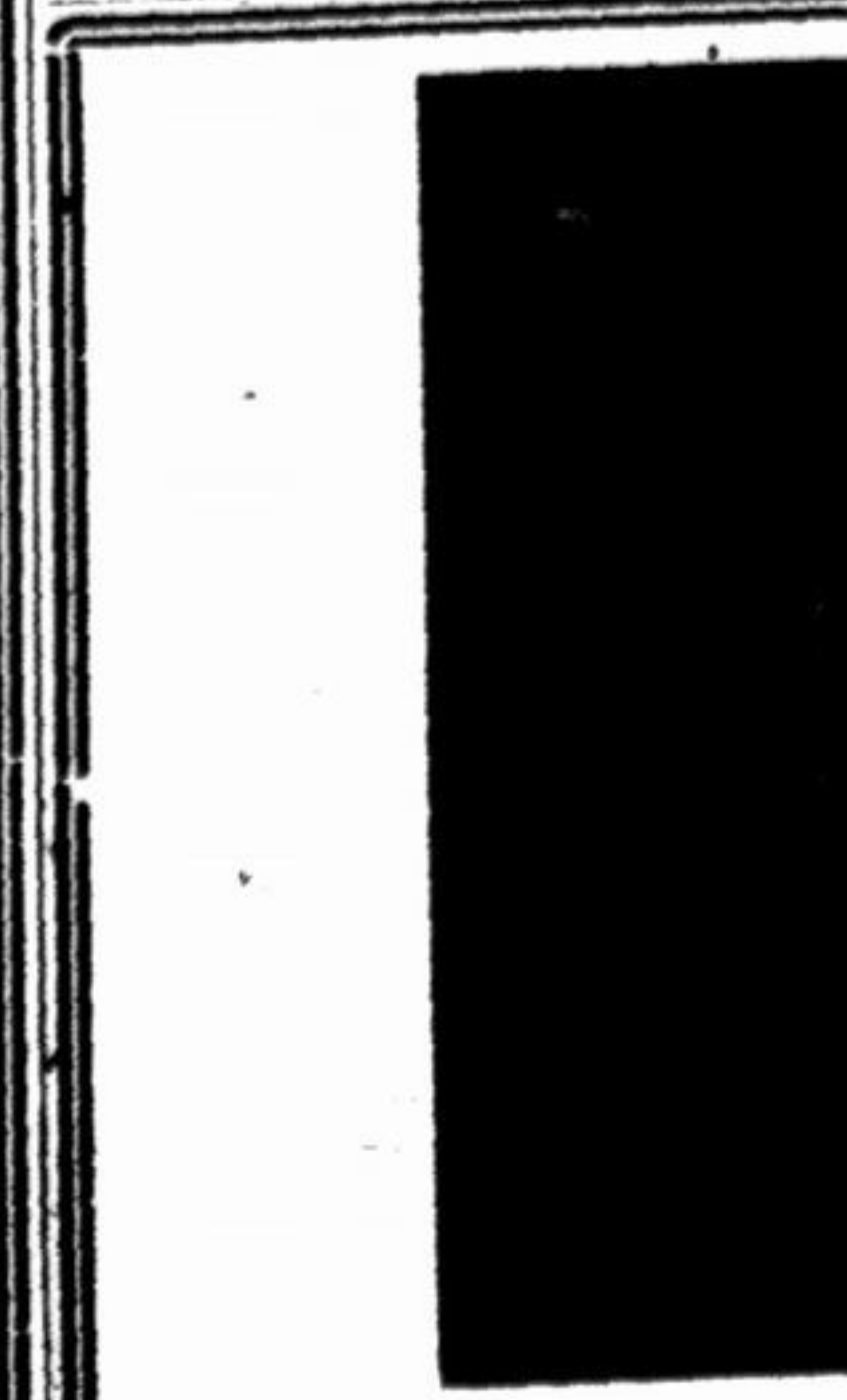
