

PLOWING AND FAIR AGAIN ATTRACTION IN WHEATLAND TWP

Riding and Tractor Plow Contests;
Grain and Vegetable Exhibits
and the Ladies' Fair

One of the classics of this part of the state will occur on Thursday, September 7, when the Wheatland Plowing Match association will hold its forty-fourth annual contest. It will take place on the farm of Walter H. Moeller, four miles north and a half mile west of Plainfield.

The contest is divided into the following classes:

- Riding Plows, Either Gang or Single
 - 1—Open to boys under 17 years.
 - 2—Open to boys under 15 years.
 - 3—Prize Winners Class.
 - 4—Post Graduate Class.

- Tractor Plow Class
 - 1—Manufacturers.
 - 2—Open to Boys 18 years or under.
 - 3—Local Tractor Class.
 - 4—Post Graduate Class.

Greatest interest centers around the local tractor class and the manufacturing tractor class but keen competition is expected in some of the boys' classes.

A new feature of the day will be a horseshoe pitching contest between teams representing Naperville, Oswego, Plainfield, DuPage and Wheatland townships. The preliminaries, to decide the best tossers in each township, will be played at ten o'clock and the finals will be staged at eleven o'clock.

Since the farm bureau has been organized many orchards are being sprayed and the plowing match officials decided to have an apple display in connection with the grain show. Booths have been spoken for by the Will Co. Farm Bureau and the Child Welfare Department of the Red Cross.

A small fee is charged for advertising exhibits. Educational exhibits are fostered by the association.

Preparations are being made for a crowd of eighteen thousand people.

RECONSTRUCTION AIDS NEEDED BY THE GOVERNMENT

Rehabilitation of Disabled Soldiers
Calls for Occupational
Therapy Heads

Washington, D. C. Aug. 31. The United States Civil Service Commission states that there is urgent need at the hospitals of the Veterans' Bureau for reconstruction aides and assistants in occupational therapy and physiotherapy in connection with the rehabilitation of disabled soldiers, sailors and marines. The commission will receive applications for these positions until further notice. Both men and women are admitted to examinations. Applications are not required to report for a written examination, but are rated upon the subjects of education, training, experience, and physical ability.

Full information concerning salaries and requirements, and application blanks, may be secured from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or the board of civil service examiners at the post office or customhouse in any city.

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Burlington Has Party of Ticket Sellers
