The Sunday School equipment of the church has been much improved by the changing of several partitions and the enlargement of the primary department. The new arrangement of facilities makes room for several additional classes in our growing school. This modern school is under the efficient administration of a superintendent with vision and ability assisted by a group of well trained teachers and officers. The Worker's Council now numbers about thirty and is made up of only officers and teachers. All parents in the community whose children do not attend Sunday School elsewhere are very cordially invited to send them to "The Friendly Church" on the corner of Main and Maple where they will be well taken care of and trained in Christian knowledge and the ideals of Christian conduct. We invite your cooperation and welcome visitors most heartily. All services are conducted in the English language. Some folks, it seems, do not understand this. There is not so much as even

a single German class in the Sunday school. We have members of Swedish, Danish, English, German and various other ancestries but are "Americans All." All are welcome!
