LIVE STOCK CO-OP MARKETING ASSN. DOING VERY WELL

A Total of 525 Cars Handled at East St. Louis During August—July Record was Beaten

Units of the Live Stock Producers Commission Association, a co-operative marketing organization sponsored and developed by the American Farm Bureau Federation, operating at the terminal markets in East St. Louis, Chicago, Indianapolis and Peoria, have recorded excellent receipts for the month of August, despite railroad difficulties.

The Producers Association at St. Louis handled a total of 525 cars for the month and exceeded July's receipts by 113 cars. At Chicago the Producers maintained its position in second place in the total cars of hogs handled, and for the final week in August held fourth place in the general totals of live stock. Indianapolis and Peoria units are recording growing receipts each week, the former unit having held first place in total receipts at its market on several occasions.

The Illinois Agricultural Association and the Missouri Farm Bureau Federation assisted the producers of East St. Louis in preparing for the big meeting of live stock producers held there Sept. 12. Dean Mumford of the college of agriculture, University of Illinois, was the chief speaker.

Troop Two will hold their first meeting since the summer's vacation Wednesday, September 20. All Scouts of this troop are requested to be present on this particular evening so that they may be fully aware of the changes to be made in the troop.

The troop sponsored by the Methodist church is in full swing and expects to increase its membership. The camping season is over and with the impetus given by it, the Boy Scout organization in Downers Grove should be brought up to a point not reach before.
