How Aluminum Occurs. Aluminum is not found in a pure form, but in combination, chiefly as an oxide in the mineral corundum (ruby, sapphire and emery); hydrated oxide in bauxite, hydrargillite and diaspore; hydrated phosphate in wavellite; hydrous sulphate in combination with potash in alunite and in combination with oxygen and metals as aluminates, as in spinel, chrysoberyl and garnite. It also is found as a silicate in various clays. Its chief ore is bauxite.
