

**BAR ASSN. BACKS
M. SLUSSER FOR
SUPREME BENCH**

Judge of the 16th Judicial Circuit Gets Endorsement of DuPage County Attorneys.

Hon. Mazzini Slusser, Judge of the 16th Judicial Circuit, was endorsed last Saturday afternoon by the Bar Association of DuPage county for a place on the Supreme Court of Illinois. The following resolution was presented to the meeting of the association and signed by every attorney present.

RESOLUTION

Whereas the proposed Constitution submitted to a vote of the People on December 12, 1922 provides for the election of a Justice of the Supreme Court residing outside of Cook County, in the district composed of the Counties of Cook, Lake, Will, Kane, Kane and DuPage, and

Whereas the legal problems arising in these Counties embrace almost every phase of the law as passed on by the Courts of this State, and

Whereas DuPage County is populated by residents whose business is conducted in the great municipality, Chicago, as well as by those whose occupations are local or agricultural, and

Whereas a Lawyer, and especially a jurist of DuPage County comes in contact with problems affecting large municipalities and its industries as well as those touching the rights in rural communities, and

Whereas this County has a distinguished jurist who, as a lawyer gained distinction at the bar of Chicago as well as at the bar of this County, who filled with commendable merit the office of County Judge and who has graced the bench of our Circuit Court because of a singular devotion to duty, of impartial integrity and a profound interpretation of the law, and

Whereas such distinguished jurist is none other than the Honorable Mazzini Slusser, now one of the Judges of the 16th Judicial Circuit, a man whose integrity is beyond reproach, whose hard application to his work can not be equalled, whose decisions are rarely reversed by the upper courts and who is trusted by all.

Be it therefore resolved by the Bar Association of DuPage County that we unanimously support the Honorable Mezzini Slusser as a candidate for the nomination for the Supreme Court of Illinois for the district of which this County is a part and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the meeting of the Bar Associations of said district to be held at Chicago.

Be it further resolved that we use all honorable means to secure the nomination and election of Judge Slusser to said office.

Judge Slusser has made an enviable reputation for honesty and fearlessness while on the bench. He was elected to the office of County Judge while a resident of Downers Grove and on his retirement from that position was elected to the office of Circuit Judge, a position he has since held.

The place on the Supreme Court bench is provided for by the new state constitution which is to be voted on December 12 and the election of these judges is to be held the same day.

GOOD POULTRY SUGGESTIONS

Of Great Importance That Feeding Utensils Be Kept Absolutely Clean—Other Hints.

"Watch the feeding utensils" is a suggestion of more importance than most poultry raisers realize. The water basins are of great importance because many contagious diseases may be spread through the drinking water. Wash and scald all water basins once a week. Each morning when filling the water basins empty all the old water out and rinse the basins before refilling. Place the basins well off the ground so that the birds will not scratch straw and dirt into the water. Locate the food hoppers so that they will be perfectly dry at all times.

Other important suggestions as to good sanitation are:

1. Be sure that the birds have plenty of fresh air.
2. Sunlight is a good germicide.
3. Clean yards are essential to good health.
