## GOOD MEETING AT LIBRARY HALL LAST EVENING

Library Hall was comfortably filled last evening at the meeting held under the auspices of the League of Women Voters, the Legislative Committee of the Woman's Club and the Citizens Association of Downers Grove. Its purpose was to give the residents of the village a change to hear an exposition of the new constitution which is to be voted on December 12.

Mr. Chas. E. Woodward, of Ottawa, president of the constitutional convention was the principle speaker and his brief outline of the work on this constitution was very concise. He told of the principle articles of

the constitution, explained them in detail, what it was hoped they would accomplish and the several points of view brought up by the delegates and how the problems of the various sections were solved mostly by compromise.

Mr. Roy C. Toombs, president of the Citizens Association was the chairman of the evening and before the address of Mr. Woodward made a few remarks relative to the aims and purpose of the association. The Rev. Newland opened with a prayer and the Rev. Kehrl led the community singing.

To close the meeting Miss Charlotte Krum introduced Mrs. Leiber, Winnetka, a member of the state education commission who spoke on the

subject of education for our boys and girls and just a few words about women in politics. She was greatly concerned over the fact that the constitutional convention failed to provide for greater educational facilities. She advanced the idea that this was more necessary than any of the sections therein and suggested that the

women must get out and do their duty as citizens if they ever expected to get anything. Her talk was received with much interest by those assembled and she was roundly applauded when she mentioned the fact that this district had a rare chance of putting a woman in the state legislature.


