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ANNUAL ARMISTICE SERVICE SUNDAY MORNING AT THE CONGREGATIONAL

American Legion Members and all Ex-Service Men Invited to Attend Church

In connection with the Armistice service, the members of Alexander Bradley Burns post of the American Legion as well as all other ex-service men of the community, have been invited to attend worship at the Congregational church, at 11:00 a. m., at which time Dr. Phelps will preach an appropriate sermon on the subject, "The Problems of Peace."

It is expected by the ministers of the town as well as by the Legion, that this service will become an established custom, and that yearly in one or the other of our churches there shall be a similar gathering on Armistice Sunday. The program for the service has been arranged in conjunction with a committee from the Legion. Commander Norman Andersen and ex-commander Dan Diener are also to have a part in the program of the morning.

RED CROSS ROLL CALL NEXT SUNDAY

Extensive plans for the Sixth Annual Red Cross Roll Call in Illinois are now under way, with representative people from many parts of the state serving as leaders, according to Central Division officials. State headquarters have been opened at 308 North Michigan avenue, and already the greater part of the state is organized for the campaign which opens Armistice Day, November 11, and continues until Thanksgiving Day, November 30.

First efforts will be made to put Downers Grove over on the roll call which will start next Sunday morning, "Red Cross Sunday" when there will be workers in each of the local churches to take memberships. The drive will be conducted until Thanksgiving Day but the committee is anxious to get as many as possible renewals early in the week. They ask all attending church Sunday morning to be ready with their membership renewals.
