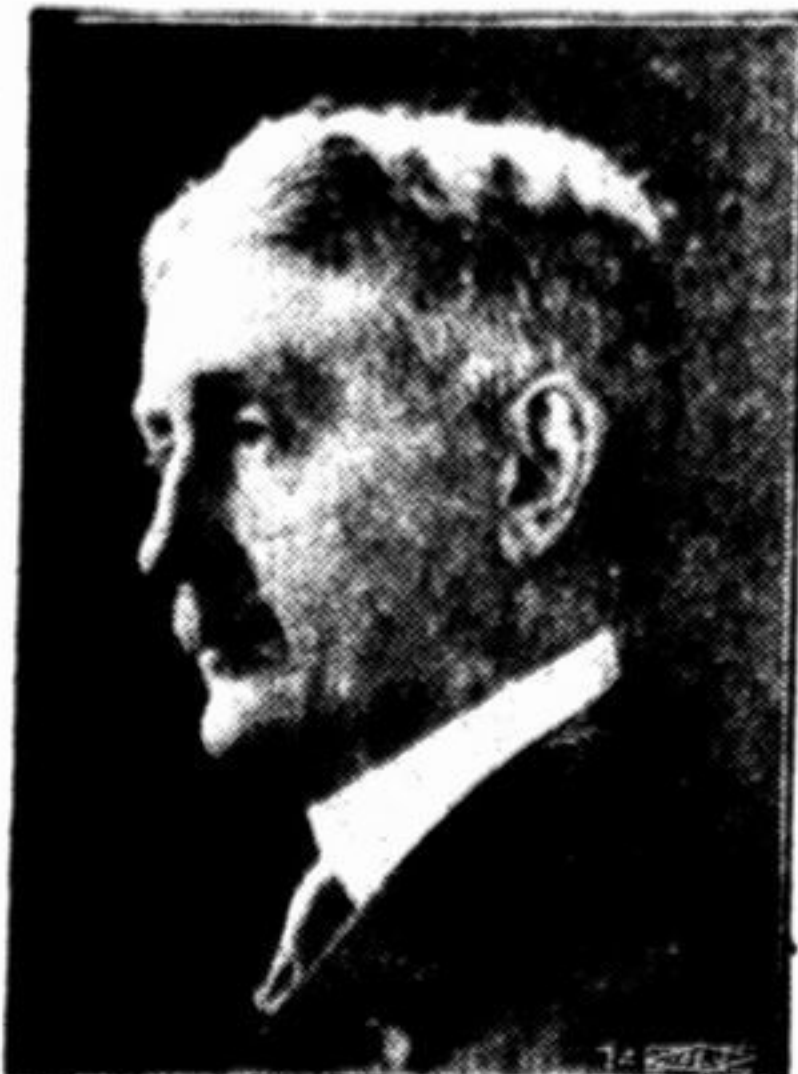

WOMANS CLUB HAD BUSY AFTERNOON

Under the auspices of the Philanthropy committee, the Downers Grove Womans club had a very full afternoon Wednesday. So long and so good was the program that it was necessary to omit the customary music.

Mrs. Frank Halas was the first speaker. She is a member of the joint committee on the Womans Eight Hour Bill and she very fully explained and discussed the measure.

Dr. Dyché, county chairman of the anti-tuberculosis society, and Miss Scallon, organizer spoke on the necessity of a county public health association and of the plans for the sale of Christmas seals which will finance the work of this association.

Dr. Jean Turner Zimmerman, superintendent of the Womans Rescue Home, of Chicago, spoke on the topic, "The Worth of a Girl." Being as she is, in direct contact with all kinds and conditions of people, and especially with girls whose conduct is not that, or rather, has not been that, of established society, she is able to speak with authority on the subject. Her talk was worth while from every viewpoint and it is certain that women should have more tolerance and would help more if all could hear her.

Love and charity for the downtrodden, no matter in what manner they strayed from the straight and narrow way, was the meat of her talk. She told of methods and successful ones, which she and her co-workers use. She gave several illustrations of girls rescued from lives not in keeping with their real character and put on the path of righteousness. Those who heard her will not soon forget the message she gave.
