HARDING GIVES OUT CAUSE FOR THANKSGIVING

President in Annual Proclamation Fixes November 30 as Day of Supplication.
Declaring that the state of the nation "presents very much to justify a nation-wide and most sincere testimony of gratitude for the bounty which has been bestowed on us," President Harding, in the annual Thanksgiving proclamation issued last week calls upon the American people to observe Thursday, November 30, "as a day of thanksgiving, supplication and devotion."

The text of the proclamation follows:
"By the president of the United States of America.
"A proclamation.
"In the beginning of our country the custom was established by the devout fathers of observing annually a day of thanksgiving for the bounties and protection which Divine Providence had extended throughout the year. It has come to be, perhaps, the most characteristic of our national observances, and as the season approaches for its annual recurrence, it is fitting formally to direct attention to this ancient institution of our people and to call upon them again to unite in its appropriate celebration.

Year of Difficulties and Achievements.
"The year which now approaches its end has been marked, in the experience of our nation, by a complexity of trials and triumphs, of difficulties and of achievements, which we must regard as our inevitable portion in such an epoch as that through which all mankind is moving. As we survey the experience of the passing 12 months we shall find that our estate presents very much to justify a nation-wide and most sincere testimony of gratitude for the bounty which has been bestowed upon us.

Growing Fraternity with World.
"Under the divine guidance which has enabled us in growing fraternity with other peoples to attain so much of progress, for the bounteous yield which has come to us from the resources of our soil and our industry, we owe our tribute of gratitude and duty and obligation to our people and to the unfortunate, the suffering, the distracted of other lands. Let us in all humility acknowledge how great is our debt to the Providence which has generously dealt with us and give devout assurance of unselfish purpose to play a helpful and ennobling part in human advancement. It is much to be desired that in rendering homage to the blessings which have come to us we should earnestly testify our continued and increasing aim to make our own great fortune a means of helping and serving, as best we can, the cause of all humanity.

U. S. R. A. IS FOR SANE LAWS ON REVOLVER OWNING

Advocates States Passing Laws Modeled on One for District of Columbia.
Dr. Reginald H. Sayre, President of the United States Revolver Association, authorizes the following:
Criminals ought not to have revolvers.

Law-abiding citizens ought to be allowed to have them for protection or any other proper purpose.
But under existing laws regulating the sale and ownership of pistols and revolvers in most of the states, criminals have no trouble in getting these weapons, while law-abiding citizens cannot get them without a great deal of trouble.

The Association believes that regulatory legislation should make it difficult—if not impossible—for the criminal to obtain a revolver, and dangerous for him to carry one.
The law ought, however, to permit decent citizens—under proper restrictions—to arm themselves for defense of life and property.

The Association, therefore, favors Senate Bill 4012, introduced by Senator Capper of Kansas, and referred to the District of Columbia Committee of the United States Senate.
Although this bill applies to the District of Columbia, it can be easily remodeled to apply to the various states. Its principal provisions are:

None but citizens, personally known, or properly identified to a licensed dealer in firearms, are permitted to purchase pistols or revolvers. Each purchaser must sign a record of sale, a copy of which must be filed with the police.
No pistol or revolver may be delivered to the purchaser until the day after the sale.

Owners of such firearms are not permitted to carry them on their persons or in a vehicle without a license from the police.
Dealers are not permitted to display pistols or revolvers, or imitations thereof, where they can be seen from the outside of the store.

Possession of a pocket firearm by a person committing or attempting to commit a felony, is regarded as prima facie evidence of criminal intent, and is punishable by five years' extra imprisonment.
Heavy penalties are prescribed for second and third offenders. Fourth offenders may be sentenced to life imprisonment.

Manufacturers' serial numbers or other identifying marks on pistols or revolvers must not be altered or erased.
Aliens and persons who have been convicted of a felony are not permitted to possess a pistol or revolver.

Using Gas to Effect Economy
It is difficult for a cook who is used to a coal range to realize the great intensity of gas range heat. When cooking on a gas range is once started it is almost impossible to use too little heat, but it is easy to use too much.

Almost all kinds of stewing or boiling should be done with the burner turned low; the results will be very much better. Rapid cooking will often spoil the food. The proper method is to start the boiling over a single burner with a full flame and then when the boiling point is reached, turn the flame very low, or transfer the sauce pan to the simmering burner.
