**DEAF, RODE IN AIRPLANE, NOW HEARS**

Many will remember in the Chicago Tribune several weeks ago of a young man, deaf from exposure while serving in the army, who was cured when he flew to a high altitude in an airplane.

A. S. Harris, the young man referred to, was in Downers Grove yesterday. He is a salesman for the S. A. Rider Co., of 323 West Adams street, Chicago and sold a bill of goods to Lehmann & Michel.

He was persuaded to talk to a representative of The Reporter on his experience and the story is worth retelling. Mr. Harris was totally deaf and many doctors told him, permanently deaf. Through the American Legion he heard of a case in New Jersey where an ex-service man had been cured by ascending to a high altitude in a plane and through the same source he was given the opportunity of trying the "cure." He grasped at the chance as a drowning man does at a straw. With not much hope of success, he climbed into a plane and the ascent began. At the 15,000 foot level he, in his own words, "suddenly thought the 'ship' was bursting to pieces, and, realizing that
