To the Editor: May I use the columns of your paper to thank the women of DuPage county for their loyal response and support at the polls on November 7? I am not unmindful of the loyal support accorded me by the men, for which I am equally grateful, but I think no one will deny that this was peculiarly a woman's battle and therefore a larger share of the credit should go to the women.

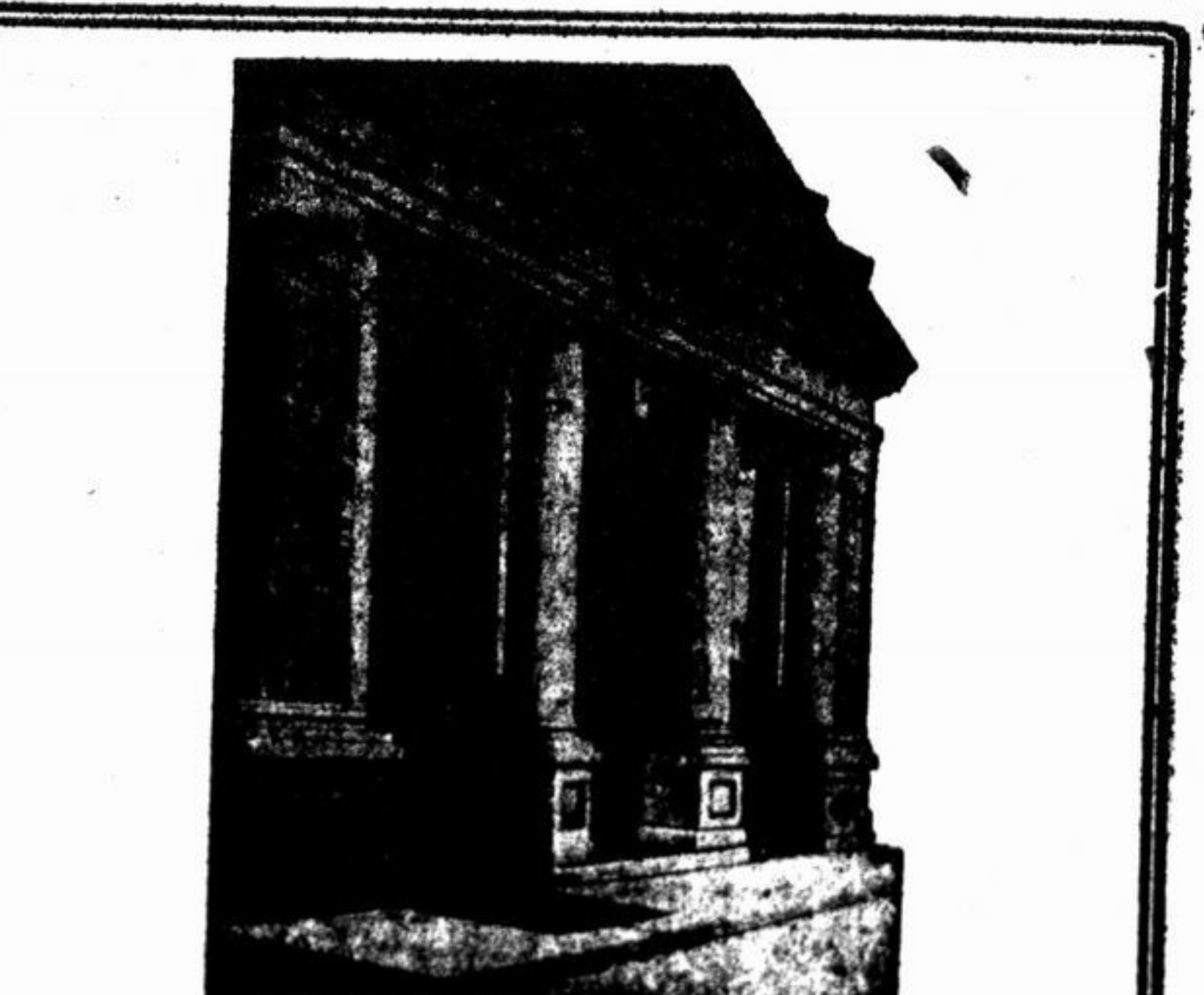
