GRAND ARMY VETS . GUESTS OF GROVE LODGE WEDNESDAY

For Sixteenth Time Local Masons Entertained the "Boys Who Wore the Blue."

Elarton, Knoblauch, Wildish and Rosenbaum sang. The audience sang the "Star Spangled Banner" as the lodge flag was brought in by Walter Johnstone.



IS SCHOOL WORK OF YOUR CHILD A PROBLEM NOW

Monthly Meetings for Mothers Designed to Smooth Paths of Parents and Teachers.

Fifteen mothers of pupils in the 8th grades spent an hour last Wednesday afternoon in the south side school discussing in an informal manner some of the school and home problems of their boys and girls.

The work being done by the Red Cross nurse, Miss Tauber, was ex plained, and the mothers urged to visit the classes which are held on Friday afternoon. The work is of such a practical nature that the mothers would derive a great deal of benefit from attendance.

Mrs. Whiffen explained the Illinsto carry out that work in the 7th and 8th grades, the pupils each paying a penny a week for the purchase of the books.

HARD ROAD BOND ISSUE UP TO VOTE NEXT WEDNESDAY

People to Decide if County Shall Build and Use its State-Aid Roads Immediately.

DuPage county votes next Wednesday, November 29, at a special election on the proposition of issuing \$1,350,000 in bonds for the building of the state-aid highways in the county. Every polling place will be open for this election at seven o'clock and remain open until five.

This highway system is designed to connect every city, village and hamlet in the county with every other one and with the existing and to be built state bond issue roads, ois Pupils Reading Circle. The plan with a hard surfaced pavement which will permit auto and other traffic twelve months of the year. It is initiated by the hard roads committee of the Board of Supervisors by the popular demand of people living in every section of the county. In order to feel out the sentiment the board several weeks ago called for a mass meeting at Wheaton. The meeting was attended by representatives from every corner of the county and the sentiment expressed was unanimous that the road system be built now so that the present generation could enjoy the roads.

Under the state-aid plan the county is authorized to issue bonds, pay for the paving and then at a later date one-half of the money expended will be returned by the state to the county. The bonds will be of the serial type and will be payable over only be issued as the money is heeded to build roads. Present plans call for the complete construction of the system within two or three years and the first work will be done next

The road system as it will be when completed on the map printed this week on page four. The heavy black lines show the state bond issue roads of which there are three running thru the county from east to west. These are the Plank road, Roosevelt road and Lake street in the south, center and north part of the territory respertively. The alternate black and white made are the highways to be improved with the county bond issue funds. They have a total mileage of 155 miles and connect with present or to be built highways in adjoining

counties. The plan will give this township a much perded hard road from Lemont north through the village, out Highland avenue to Roosevelt road and then north through Lombard. Every other village in the territory will receive the same treatment.
