He examined the scouts, or a part of them, in first aid and life saving, and taught them several new games. The future holds many possibilities for this troop under the capable guidance of the new scoutmaster and the active troop committee composed of Savage, Wildish, Kester and Henderson. Scoutmaster Sweeney announced that the following week's meeting would be held out of doors. The Bear Patrol is still in the lead in the inter-patrol contest and it looks as though the contest will close with that patrol having the highest number of points.

Troop 2 is rapidly taking form since their reorganization this fall and for almost every older boy that dropped out or advanced to the Rangers of the Rectangle the troop has gained a new member.

Scout leaders, workers and the men of the community interested in the Boy Scout movement missed something if they were not present Tuesday evening at the Round Table meeting and Training Course. Four new members were present. They were Alex Miskelly, Dan Diener, "Bill" Miskelly and Mr. Peoples. Mr. Miskelly is to become a committee-man of Troop 2; Bill Miskelly and Mr. Peoples will present their applications as assistant scoutmasters this coming week and Dan Diener intends to actively help in the program with in perhaps a month's time when he has disposed of his present rush of work.

This was the first meeting of the Training class and each member present passed the Tenderfoot test. The Evolution of the Flag was taught by use of pictures showing the first American flag with its thirteen stripes and its crosses of St. George and St. Andrew which was a sign of our allegiance to England; then came our first war flag to England; and our second flag, showing the spirit of the times, had the thirteen stripes and in the field a rattlesnake and under it the motto "Don't Tread on Me," and so on to our present flag adopted in 1912.

Committeeman Weinheimer creditably passed his test with the exception of tying the two half hitches knot; but is well on his way in the race with his son to complete the second class test. Dan Diener, a former sailor, received the grade of A in knots; Scoutmaster O'Neill skillfully demonstrated the tying of the Sheepshank. President Ray believes that if he was the hero rescuing a person in a burning building it would be quicker for him to carry that person down the fire escape than to waste valuable time trying to tie the life saving bowline knot.

A blackboard chart showing that one-eighth of the boys in the United States and but one-fourth of the boys in Downers Grove have been reached by Scouting gave the leaders an idea of what value their work would be in helping bring up our percentage. Second class tests will be given at the next Round Table meeting the third Tuesday of December. If any one is interested let them come. Our aim is—true to the spirit of Scouting—to assist our local leaders in giving more efficient service to boys thru the scout program which helps boys make of themselves better men.

Miss Eleanor Corcel, of Oak Park, played Lohengrin's wedding march and Mrs. Margaret Walker sang "Oh

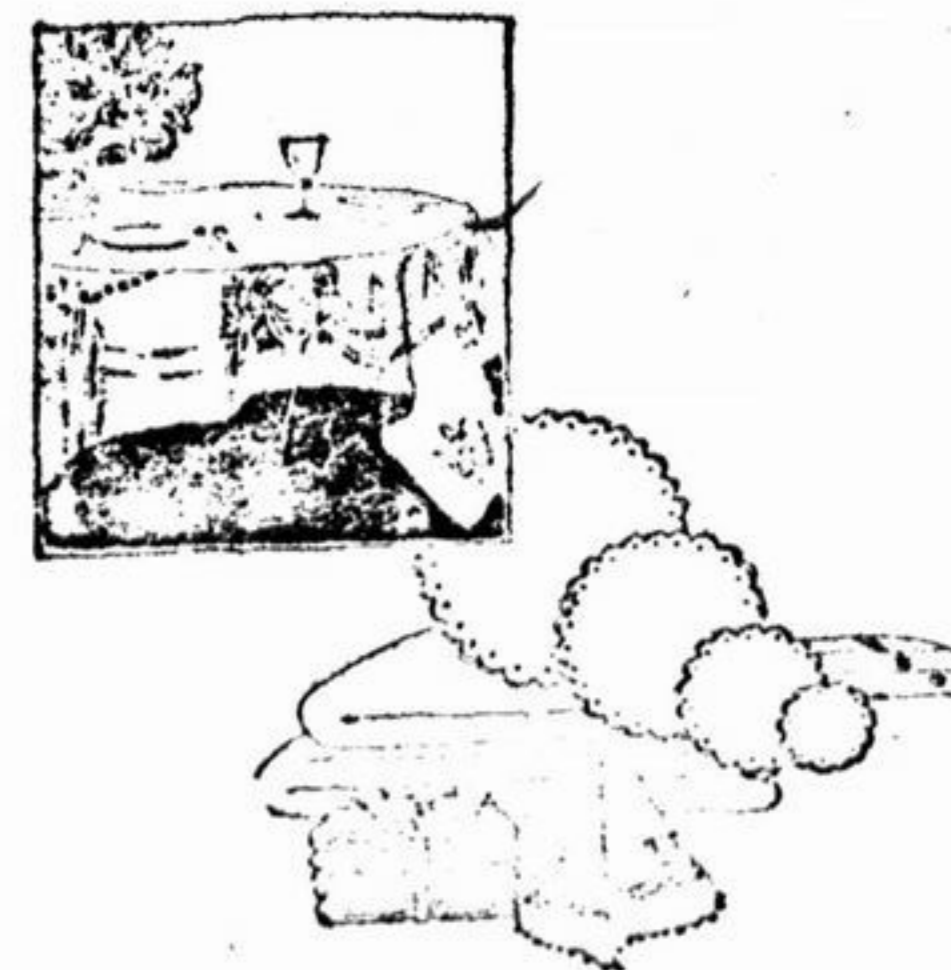
Needless to say a second shower of congratulations was forthcoming.
