

LLOYD FISHER, A FORMER RESIDENT, DIES IN GEORGIA

Passes Away at Macon from Burns Received Several Months Ago in Airplane Accident.

Word has been received in the village of the death several weeks ago of Lloyd Fisher at a hospital at Macon, Georgia, from burns received in an airplane accident. Fisher was a former resident of Downers Grove, attended the local schools and is remembered by his school mates for his cool nerve in any situation, his dare-devilishness and all around ability to take care of himself.

During the war he was with the aviation branch of the service and since has been doing exhibition flying. About three months ago, with two passengers he was starting on a flight when the wing of his plane hit an unseen guy wire of a tall smoke stack. The ship crashed to the ground the gas tank exploding enveloping the three in flames. His passengers were burned to death almost immediately, Fisher escaping with severe burns about the face, head, and upper part of his body. In an effort to save his life his wife gave 98 pieces of skin from her body to graft onto his. He was apparently improving when he learned that should he recover he would be crippled for life. This took the heart out of his fight and he passed away soon after. His is interred in a Macon cemetery.
