the court house, will be the chief
clerk. He is conversant with the
many details of this, one of the most
important offices in the county. Law-
rence Hattendorf, who was chief de-
puty under Leineke, will also assist
Mr. Wagemann.

Mrs. Cora Eckstrom, daughter of
the retiring clerk, A. A. Kuhn, who
has been for so long a time employed
in this office, that she seemed a part
of it, will no doubt be greatly missed
from her place. She, with her sister,
Miss Reta Kuhn, will hold positions
in the office of George Fix, County
Treasurer.
