AN OUTLOOK FOR OUR **SCHOOLS**

Society recognizes that every child deserves has the right to his education. It is of utmost importance that this child shall have an educational opportunity that measures up to his expanding capacity. The future of society depends on the more capable of the group. Those of average capacity will maintain the present level but the present level is stagnation -we need current and direction.

Under present conditions in most of our schools - grade and highstifted children are seldom working by to their capacity. The race of the sortoise and the hare is duplicated under the eyes of every school teachor every day in the year. Gifted mentality is asleep while mediocrity plods away. The plodder wins out but the distance covered, the thought prevoked is lamentable.

The total efficiency of our educational plants—the biggest institution in our community, will be materially increased when we have made adequate provision for this group of children who are either asleep, bored by listening to work of a type which they recognize as inferior, or are becoming an added source of worry to the teacher because their inattention to uninteresting exercises invites ways of self amusement.

Some plans to provide appropriate esportunity for progress thru school at a rate which is best for the various abilities discovered and to pursue studies adapted to their capacities are being carried out in our schools this year.

In the lower grades both teachers and superintendent are constantly on the lookout for children showing marked ability. Skipping of grades our form of providing for maximum effort from children showing umusual mental acuteness and power of assimilation. The decision to promote a pupil may be made at any time in the school year thru a conference between teachers and superintendent based upon daily attack of class assignment, frequent general intelligence tests, and tests covering grade subject matter. We have had several instances of this plan of procedure during the past year.

Another plan whereby a strong group of a grade is placed in a separate section and permitted to advance as rapidly as they are able, covering the subject matter outlined for this grade, may be put into opexation here in the near future.

The enriched curriculum in segra-

gated classes is a plan now in effect in several of our school rooms. These segregated pupils do not come into contact with other children in the course of their regular school work. The lesson assignments are more comprehensive, outside or collateral reading is required, special topics worked up and out, and individuality in their work encouraged.
