#### INSTITUTE CONVENTIONS WELL ATTENDED THIS AUTUMN

The thirteen Women's Institute Conventions held in Ontario this fall were attended by over 4,000 women. Members from the most isolated districts of new Ontario, as well as those from the thickly settled townships of old Ontario, had the opportunity of contact with the meetings of these conventions. Only a small minority of the 1,371 Institutes failed to send a delegate to the convention in their a delegate to the convention in their

A great interest was shown in the development of home gardens at the convention of the Kenora-Rainy Riverconvention of the Kenora-Rainy River-Thunder Bay area. If the Institutes of old Ontario can send bulbs, shrubs, and other roots, they will be greatly appreciated in the north. Names of Institutes in this area will be given to any inquiring Institute from old Ontario. One branch at this convention reported that it planned its yearly programme by making one of the Standing Committees function as a focal point and integrating with it the work of other committees. The London, Hamilton and Toronto conventions were very largely attended this year. Special emphasis was placed on Historical Research, Agricultural problems and the educational programme in Home Economics. All these conventions were distinguished by a sparkle and vitality not always felt in a convention. Care of Health and encouragement of the Committee on Peace Education and International Relationships were two important features of the Ottawa convention. The Barrie, Kingston, Belleville and Goderich convention functioned as

clearing-houses for the promotion of better organization and programmes.

The conventions of old Ontario allotted time for the presentation of the work and accomplishments of the Juniors.

## PRACTICAL RESOLUTIONS **ENDORSED BY** ONTARIO CONVENTIONS

Resolutions passed by the Women's Institute Conventions held in Ontario in 1935 were examined by the Provincial Board Meeting held in November, in order that they might receive the endorsement of the whole membership rather than represent sectional opinion only. Unfortunately, the resolutions of some of the Convention Areas were not sent to the Provincial Board.

The outstanding resolution to be presented to the Dominion Govern-

ment is:

"That the F. W. I. O. urge the adoption of a system of marking and labelling articles for the retail trade in a manner that the consumer may know by the label the exact quality of the article; And we endorse the Price Spreads Commission's suggestion that the work of definition labelling and the work of definition, labelling, and the establishment of consumer stand-ards of quality might begin with the following:—Textiles, especially wool and silk mixtures, and the mixtures of and silk mixtures, and the mixtures of these two with other fibres; clothing, with particular reference to quality of cloth; meat and dairy products; fish and fish products, especially fillets; petroleum products, especially fuel oil and gasoline; lubricating oil; paints, varnishes and enamels; electrical appliances and light bulbs; soaps, cleansers and cleaning fluids; silver plated ware to indicate thickness and quality of plating and chromium quality of plating and chromium plated ware; leather goods and foot-wear; flour and bread." Some of the important resolutions to be presented to the Government of

Ontario are:
"That the Public Health Nursing be restored and further Service

organized.
"Whereas the Women's Institutes of South Bruce are greatly concerned about the increasing ravages of tuberculosis in their district: Be it resolved that a health education pro-gramme in the prevention of tuber-culosis would be most acceptable in that district.

"That the Department of Public "That the Department of Public Health prepare, in pamphlet form, five minute talks on various health subjects that would be useful in the Women's Institute local meetings. "Whereas the boys of rural Ontario have the advantage of an Agricultural Representative at all times to advise and assist them, and the gives

cultural Representative at all times to advise and assist them, and the girls have at best a very restricted period during which they can receive help with their work: Be it resolved that the F. W. I. O. request that earnest consideraion be given this matter and that, if at all possible, a qualified woman supervisor, a graduate of a recognized School of Home Economics, be appointed for each district of four appointed for each district of four

"Whereas the book 'Laws Relating to Women and Children', compiled by the late Mr. Alan Dymond, is now unobtainable, and, in any event, needs revising, we the F. W. I. O. hereby request that the Ontario Government make a similar appropriation to cover the compiling and publishing of another, such book to be sold at a similar price."

The resolution to be presented to the F. W. I. C. for their endorsement is: "That the duty on whiskey be raised and that on sugar be lowered."

A resolution was passed to be pre-sented to the Boards of the Royal Winter Fair and the Canadian Nat'l Exhibition.

"Whereas the Women's Institutes of Ontario represent 42,000 women of rural Ontario; And whereas this is the only organized body of women so widely representing farm and home life in rural Ontario: Be it resolved that we the F. W. I. O. express to the Boards of the Royal Winter Fair and the Canadian Nat'l Exhibition apthe Canadian Nat'l Exhibition appreciation of past courtesies: And be it further resolved that we respectively suggest that provision be made for the inclusion of a representative from this organization on the Boards of the Winter Fair and the Canadian Nat'l Exhibition".

#### PROVINCIAL BOARD ARIFIED MANY PROBLEMS AT ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the pro-ncial board of the Federated Wo-en's Institutes of Ontario was held November 21st and 22nd at Tor-November 21st and 22nd at Torto. The sessions were presided over Mrs, R. B. Colloton. All the memrs of the board were present with e exception of Mrs. A. George, who as absent on account of the death of r husband. Mrs. J. W. Lewis acted alternate for Mrs. George.

Representatives from the Institutes pointed to advise with the Royal inter Fair, Social Hygiene Council, ed Cross Society, Girl Guide Association, Travelling Libraries, Adult Edution Section of the Ontario Edutional Association and Ontario emperance Association reported emperance Association, reported.

The chairman emphasized that ranches should remit the Federation less to the district secretary by ebruary 1, as members entering later o not pay for the current year. The district secretary should forward less fees to the provincial secretary mediately after the district annual, a September 30th closes the fiscal lear of the Federation.

The president in her address nphasized the importance of the esiding officers using good pro-dure in conducting meetings, recon-ended that all district annuals nended that all district annuals tould have both morning and afteroon sessions, explained the need of the observance of non-sectarianism and non-partisan rulings, urged roper reporting as not more than ne-tenth of the activities are now reorted, stressed the advisability of awing the president's signature on all cheques in addition to that of the certary, discouraged the use of the creques in addition to that of cretary, discouraged the use of the stitute as an advertising agency, adsed that board members should ways attend district annuals in eir sub-division and not to wait on an invitation, and stated that pon an invitation, and stated that hiscellaneous requests for relief hould not be considered by Institutes ntil the cases were investigated by

The discussion showed that the ew committee of Peace Education and International Relationships is tready carrying on good programmes many districts. Mrs. J. E. Houck, rovincial convener, advised Institutes be keep a scrap book on World Peace.
