period a number of matters had to be left over for the spring session. Answering the roll for each meet-ing were the twenty Board members of which eleven were present for the first time, and five conveners of standing committees.

Much Business Discussed

There was the usual routine of business, which was simplified somewhat by having the sub-executive meet be-fore the general sessions opened. The

Forty-three resolutions were dealt with most ably by Mrs. Clarence Holmes, Past President. The majority of these were sustained and are published separately in this issue.

Inspirational Addresses

The address of the President was one of inspiration as she urged all to work to preserve the esteem in which we are already held. When other groups disband, welcome them to our ranks and make as our slogan (and work at it) 50,000 members for our 50th anniversary in 1947. As good Women's Institute members we must be well informed in the trends and policies in Government at home and abroad and set ourselves to form a sane, sensible public opinion.

Miss Lewis also brought an inspiring message as she told of all that the Department of Agriculture is planning for us through the Women's Institute Branch. There are tangible things to which we can point as a part of our success but the intangible part of our success but the intangible things such as the spirit of tolerance unings such as the spirit of tolerance and co-operation mean most in achieving our goals. She, too, urged us to be well informed and take the positive rather than the negative appeal, tive rather than the negative appear, to read, discuss and work towards good citizenship. "Let us not hoard our opportunities," she said, "but find new groups and learn to live well by sharing. Introduce more fun into our

programs. Give each member a chance to express herself. To develop good sportsmannin and good leadergood sportsmanship and good leader-ship in our Institutes pass the hon-ours around. Many do not know their potentialities until they try."

"It is up to each to help and en-courage the others to work and strive towards bringing all that is best for Home and Country."

Miss Lewis announced that there are thirteen new staff members ap-pointed and more requests for all ser-vices have been received than in previous years. She described the new Community Centre being set up at

Cayuga.

The Brief on Education
The Brief on Education, presented
to the Royal Commission on Education since the Spring Board meeting, was presented and explained by Mrs. Summers. This was to many of us the "high light" of the meeting. It dealt with more rural representation on the commission; greater equality of edu-cational opportunity between rural and urban students; greater measure of equality in experience of rural and urban teachers; provision for itinerant teachers for special subjects; more Provincial financial aid to rural more Provincial financial aid to rural schools; dental and medical services for rural schools; assistance towards beautification of rural schools grounds and interiors; installation of radios in rural schools; Bible study a part of the curriculum; and adequate sex instruction. There There were 56,904 knitted articles and 92,790 sewn garments, 26,377 pounds of jam for Britain and 6,504 blood donors among the Institute members.

Mrs. Tait's report on Central Fund for War Charities showed \$9,198.23 contributed since January 1st and up to October 1st \$7,306.45 had been sent

on for war work.
Comforts for hospitalized veterans is the main issue for this coming year and \$1,000.00 was voted to be used for this. For the mine sweepers used for this. For the mine sweepers \$250.00 and for the Save the Children Fund also \$250.00. Miss Lewis reported that \$5,475.00 had been donated through the Women's Institute to the Hospital for Sick Children.
