This is in sharp contrast to the years of the immedate past where the story was one of disbanding.

Leeds—The Standing Committee Reports were unusually well compiled and well presented, particularly Social Welfare. Some of the reported activities were the clinic for the immunization of children against diphtheria;

zation of children against diphtheria; the arranging of transportation of 50 persons to a chest clinic; the canvas of local citizens which resulted in a petition to the council for the establishment of a library.

Brockville—The District presented prizes to school children for such projects as the making of a "Book of Good Manners", animal pictures, door stops, toys and temperance posters. These articles were on display at the meeting, and were judged, and prizes awarded.
