## GUELPH AREA MEET AT O.A.C. (13 Districts—196 Institutes —Attendance 400)

With Mrs. Chas. Robertson as chairman over 400 women assembled chairman over 400 women assembled to take part in a very busy and interesting 2 day convention following the theme "Happiness is not an end to be attained but is something we create within ourselves".

Space permits us to highlight only 1 speaker. Dr. E. T. Salmon, McMaster University, gave much food for thought in his talk on "Developments in International Affairs".

"In times of peace," said Dr. Salmon, "people are interested in their own affairs until war looms. Recent international developments have been, on the political side, the signing of

own analyses with any looms. Recently international developments have been, on the political side, the signing of the Atlantic Pact, the council of Europe treaty signed at Strausburg, the quarrel between Tito and Stalin, the delay to signing the peace treaty with Austria, the weakening of Britain's political ties with Ireland, India and South Africa. Other developments have been the dollar crisis, recession of business conditions in the United States, growing unemployment in Berlin and the trade unions trying to purge themselves of communist elements. With modern communications making the world so small, it is inevitable that these events have repercussions in other parts of the globe."

About the future possibility of peace, the speaker thought there was no immediate threat of a third world

no immediate threat of a third world war. Lack of steel in Russia was one reason and the temperament of the English speaking peoples is not such that they would start war. Com-munism thrives on human misery.

## LAKEHEAD (5 Districts—58 Institutes —Attendance 140) The Lakehead convention, held one

day in Fort William and one day in Port Arthur, carried out the theme "Developing a More Abundant Life in Our Rural Communities and a Deeper Appreciation of the Things Near at Hand".

Startling statistics were revealed by Mr. G. A. Noble, Inspector of Schools when he challenged the women on lack of attendance at school meetings. "Only 213 of 1000 people come to administer \$50,000", said Mr. Noble. He also added that the greater the interest taken by women the more interest there will be in education. He would like to see the day when women could be in control for at least one day. "They are good house cleaners!" he said one day. "The ers!" he said.

Also carrying out the theme of the convention Dr. G. E. Moodie, Medical Health Officer spoke on health units, a project which Women's Institutes are working on in the North Western sections of Ontonio tion of Ontario.

Mrs. J. H. Booth, area chairman, warmly welcomed not only our own Provincial President and Director but also Miss Frances McKay Director of Women's Work for Manitoba.
