

Dunrobin's most popular programme was an address on Art Education by an artist. There was an exhibit of local art and the roll call was answered by showing a picture—in most cases a small print. **Johnston May's** favorite meeting was one at which they entertained five neighboring branches, each Institute contributing one number to the programme. They made new friends and enjoyed the fine spirit of the gathering. **South Mountain** enjoyed most a programme of talks and films on Agriculture and Reforestation; **Teeterville** a combined "International and Family Night." Several Institutes in Norfolk County reported that their most interesting programme feature was Eleanor Saracuse's report of her visit to Britain as one of the four Junior Farmer members selected for the trip. **Nestleton:** A talk on "Mental Health" by Mr. J. D. Parks of the Canadian Mental Health Association because it "opened up new avenues of thought." **Kendal:** a meeting when New-Canadian women demonstrated national dishes of the Netherlands, Czechoslovakia and Poland; this "helped the Institute women get acquainted with their Canadian neighbors." **Adolphus-town:** A New-Canadian night—a social event for the whole family. **Corinth:** A programme arranged by the local farm forum to make a "family night" when Don Small, Nuffield scholarship winner, showed his colored slides on Agriculture in England and Scotland. **Luton:** A programme put on by the local station of the Department of Lands and Forests at an evening meeting to which men and children were invited. **North Yarmouth:** A historical research programme on pioneer days in the district. **Shedden** also found Don Small's pictures one of their most interesting features, also a talk on mental illness by Earl Moore of the Ontario Hospital. **Dutton:** A panel discussion on "Our Community and What It Means To Me." **Boxall:** A programme under the Citizenship Convener, discussing the questions in the leaflet "The Citizen as a Parent."

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Many branches reported that their most interesting programme had been on Health, with films and talks by doctors or nurses. Several found talks on Mental Health most helpful. A number wrote that their most interesting meeting was the visit from their District President. "Grandmothers' Meetings" were very popular, especially where the grandmothers took part in the programme. At **South Glenelg** the grandmothers sang, danced, recited and served an old fashioned lunch. **Dornoch** said the girls' meeting was the most interesting when Homemaking Club girls demonstrated "New Life for the Old Skirt" and "The Milk Bar." **Dromore** placed first the girls' demonstration of table setting.

Royaltide's International Day programme was the most interesting; a woman from Holland gave a talk on her native land. **Kenard**

placed first "the day we welcomed our New Canadians." **Rainham Centre:** the day the county Home Economist spoke on Girls' Homemaking Club Work. **Nelles Corners:** a programme on Education when the Institute entertained the teachers from the three schools in the area. **Nanticoke:** "a meeting when a New-Canadian compared our country with hers. It was a great help to us to learn their ways, also to meet some of her friends." **Willow Grove** and **Lake Shore** in Norfolk had similar reports.

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Huntingdon East's outstanding programme was put on by a visiting Indian Homemakers Club with addresses by Indian women, also by the District President, Convention Chairman and F.W.I.O. Board Member. **Fordwich:** a debate "Resolved that people were healthier 75 years ago than they are today"—and an exhibit of Girl's Homemaking Club Work. **Union:** a debate "Resolved that a large kitchen is more desirable than a small one."

Bluevale's most interesting programme was on Citizenship with an address on "The Value of a Library to the Community." As a result of this meeting the Institute donated \$100 to the library fund and put on a variety concert to raise further funds.

Kippen East: a talk on tuberculosis. **Clinton Juniors:** a demonstration of sewing machine attachments. **Colwanash Juniors:** the history of the community. **Goderich:** a Citizenship programme on "How to make good citizens of today's youth." **Wingham,** also **Jean Brumpton** branch: talks on the making of Wills. **Brigden's** most outstanding meeting took the form of a hobby fair with a big display of members' hobby achievements. **Forest:** a panel discussion on Education with members of the High School staff participating. **Lucasville:** a talk on NATO, followed by a review and quiz conducted by the convener of Citizenship and Education.
