At Lynn Valley a letter was read from the German family, pen friends of the Institute, and the program convener read excerpts from a radio broadcast of the Secretary General of the UN, also an article on Rev. John Christie Holland, Negro minister and Hamilton's "Man of the Year." The Colombo Plan was discussed and the general importance of giving technical assistance to less privileged countries.

At Welland County's International Day, along with addresses by Mrs. H. A. Coon of Toronto and Mrs. Hugh Summers, musical entertainment was provided by representatives of various new Canadian groups. ## Cookery Around the World

MIXED SALAD

India

Skin and prepare 4 oranges, half a pineapple, and cut up into slices. Mix some cream cheese with one or two ounces of chopped cashew nuts and shape into small balls. Instead of cream cheese, ordinary hard cheese finely grated and mixed with butter may be used. Arrange the sliced fruit on lettuce leaves and garnish with the cheese balls. Sprinkle over just before serving a little salad dressing.
