An illustrated talk on Birds by Mr. J. L. Baillie of the Division of Ornithology, Royal Ontario Museum, was the feature of one evening. At another session Ethel Chapman talked on "Culture in the Country Home" and the film "Canadian Landscape" — the story of A. Y. Jackson and his painting was shown. A banquet was a highlight of the conference with the Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Mr. C. D. Graham, Miss Anna P. Lewis, Director of the Women's Institute Branch, Mr. Burke,

General Manager Social Welfare of Jamaica and members of the college faculty as guests. Of Mr. Graham's address at this banquet one of the girls, Leila Nephew, wrote to us: "Mr. Graham's address did indeed, as he expressed it, 'stimulate our imagination and arouse our curiosity to delve into new projects.' "The girls proposed toasts with the graciousness and poise of experienced club women which, even allowing for personal gifts, says something for the training they get in their club work. At a session following the banquet, Mr. Burke told the girls something about 4-H Club work in Jamaica.

In letters that came to us following the conference, different girls spoke of different features of the program that had especially impressed them, but all of the letters referred to the value of simply being with other girls and conferring with them. Here are some of the comments:
