The first afternoon began with a "tractor tour" of the School farm to see the barns and the experimental plots. Then they had a session with Miss Ruth Rorke, Director of the Home Economics Division, discussing the School's Home Economics work and seeing colored films showing something of the girls' course of study and the school life for both

boys and girls.

Mrs. A. L. Gibson of Kemptville, Regional Vice-President, F.W.I.O., substituting for the President, Mrs. Gordon MacPhatter, was mistress of ceremonies at the "get acquainted party" the first evening throughout the holi-day. By special request, Mrs. Roy Graham of South Mountain was on hand to help with music, and Mr. G. H. (Dusty) Miller and Mr. L. P. Poirier, of Community Programmes led in a session of games and singing. These recreation leaders afterwards said something to the effect that the job was not so much "leading" the women as trying to keep up with

Each morning after brief devotional exercises, led by Mrs. Gibson, members of the Women's Institute Branch took over. Ethel Chapman led discussions on "Literature and Living"; Isabel Leslie directed a project in leathercraft—most of the women made purses to take home with them; Nora Creyke spoke on "Your Wardrobe-A Plan for the Present and the Future", demonstrating her points with a variety of clothes shown on live young

The women spent some time browsing about the school library. They had an enjoyable illustrated lecture on Landscape Gardening by Mr. H. E. Ransom of the School's Horticulture Department, and a stimulating session with Mr. Skilling of the National Film Board, seeing films on local beauty spots, mental health, and the assimilation of New Canadians. There was a lively discussion following the New Canadian picture. They visited the local Forestry Station nursery and heard something about tree planting from the Superintendent, Mr. C. R. Lane. On their last night in residence, after a quite dignified "home talent" concert, they went to their rooms and reappeared in night attire for an old-time square dance.

There is no doubt that the women who came to this holiday had a good time. Their speakers and leaders found them a most responsive and stimulating group to work with. The only expressed lack in the holiday was that it was

not long enough.
